Editorial

"All you need is love. But a little chocolate now and then doesn't hurt." Charles M. Schulz (1922-2000), creator of the Peanuts comic strip featuring Charlie Brown and Snoopy.

What connects beekeeping, epilepsy, the plague, fainting, travelling and a chubby cherub? The answer is Valentine of Terni, who is the patron saint of all these areas. A third-century Roman priest, or perhaps a Bishop, he supposedly performed secret Christian weddings against the wishes of the authorities and was executed on 14th February, possibly in 269 AD.

Sufficient confusion about the identity of St. Valentine led the Catholic Church in 1969 to discontinue liturgical veneration of him (for example, no longer bowing or making the sign of the cross before a saint's icon, relics or statue), though his name remains on its list of recognised saints.

Valentine's Day as we know it might have originated with medieval English poet Geoffrey Chaucer. His work 'The Parlement of Foules' refers to 14th February as the day foules (fowls or birds) come together to choose their mates for the year. No tradition of courtly love existed until after this poem was published around 1375.

The chubby cherub we call Cupid has been associated with Valentine's Day for many centuries. He was known to the ancient Greeks as Eros, the god of love. What you might not know is that he had two sets of arrows, one for love and the other for hate, playing havoc with the desires and affections of his victims.

The tradition of giving a box of chocolates to a valentine is more recent. It began in the 19th century when Richard Cadbury of the chocolate manufacturing company saw the day as an opportunity to sell more product.

Payable garden waste collection



From 1st March 2022, Cherwell District Council will start charging for garden waste collections. From this date you will no longer be able to put food waste in your brown bin.

The annual cost of a brown bin licence is £36 if you sign up by 28th February 2022, or £40 from 1st March. If you have more than one brown bin, each additional subscription will cost £30 a year. You can sign up to the service at https://forms.cherwell.gov.uk/xfp/form/534

Blue and green bins will continue to be emptied without a charge.

From 1 March 2022, the Council will start a free separate weekly food waste collection service from your property. A food waste caddy will be delivered to you during February. Only one size of outdoor caddy will be available. You should not need an additional caddy as the food waste is collected weekly.

Margaret Mason 1945 – 2022

A tribute from the Parish Council

It is surely the case that Margaret was one of the most, if not the most, significant members of the Parish Council during its 100+ years history. Her sudden passing has shocked and saddened the Parish Council which would like to pay tribute to Margaret for her long service on the Council.

Margaret first joined the Council in May 1986, becoming Vice-Chair in May 1990, before being elected Chair in 1994, a post she held until stepping down in May 2014. This total of 28 years must be one of the longest-ever periods of service, but even more notable is what she achieved in 20 years as Chair. I joined the council in May 1998 and am the only member remaining who served under Margaret. I will give a flavour of Margaret's work for the village.

Back in 1998 I assumed that Margaret had already been Chair for more than four years such was the smooth nature of the meetings. Margaret was the very opposite of those Chairs (not the Parish Council, but in the wider world) who aim to get through the business of any length in 30 minutes or so by racing along and not giving members of their committees time to say anything before moving on to the next item. Margaret was always very well informed about every item of business, but always gave everyone their say (however off-beam) even if this meant some tangential excursions into various village issues. 'Light touch' and 'enjoyable' come to mind.

I quickly realised that Margaret was very well informed about planning issues and rules, had lots of contacts at Highways and Cherwell DC, all of whom seemed always to be at the other end of the phone, and had a good appreciation for what architectural styles suited in rural new developments.

I am sure that Margaret would have been very active on the PC around 1990 when the village was faced with direct take-offs of planes over the village from Upper Heyford. But in my time I would pick out several developments where her guidance and acumen led to the best possible outcomes for the village. The first of these was redevelopment and extension of the football pitches. This stemmed from an inescapable requirement to provide decent changing rooms if the village football team was to continue playing in local leagues. It transpired that the only way to get funding for this was to make it part of a larger package of football enhancements. In summary, this involved flattening the Dr Radcliffe's school pitch and transferring the excess soil to the other side of road so as to extend the turfed area into land

which was at the time wooded and owned by a farmer. This involved multiple funding sources and permissions, plus taking out a loan which only now has just one remaining year to run. We were fortunate in that Richard Preston, the Vice-Chair, was a master of fundraising and that others in the village contributed various technical expertises; they were all very significant and energetic driving forces. A consequence was a big hike in the precept to pay for some of the work with the remainder being met by grants. Margaret had to co-ordinate the Parish Council's part, both in seeking permissions and making applications, as well as convincing those like me who were a bit sceptical that this was a doable, affordable and wanted project. A much larger piece of complex business than most Chairs would expect to encounter.

The second 'big' thing was the building of the houses in Lawrence Fields. It is fair to say that there was opposition to this, but Margaret played a key role in reconciling different interests, controlling the height of the houses, the layout and importantly the retention of the medieval hedge in front of the development. This was the famous occasion when Margaret lay in front of the digger which was about to remove all the hedgerow.

A third significant development was the building of the 'affordable' houses at Shepherds Hill. She and others discovered that the land, then uncultivated, was owned by Cherwell and so the Parish Council took up the cause to use the land for such housing. This I clearly recall was a complicated business, but in the end Margaret checked that the houses were of a good design and blended into the village, while also ensuring that the required pavement connecting the development to the village was rebuilt to make it more compatible with a rural environment.

I am not sure of the details, but I think that Margaret was much involved in the acquisition of leases for the Village Hall and Sport and Recreation buildings and certainly the torturous process of acquiring the lease for the allotments (how she stayed so calm in the face of repeatedly incorrect maps provided by the lawyers I will never know). One of her biggest achievements was the re-roofing of the Village Hall. A modest grant was obtained from the Heritage Lottery Fund for what were thought to be relatively small repairs. Once the men got on the roof and removed some of the tiles they announced that every tile needed replacing and that the tiles could not be reused to cover the parts they had already exposed. Margaret contacted the Lottery Fund and somehow persuaded them almost immediately to increase the grant substantially to £65,000, allowing the work to continue and saving the Village Hall from rainwater damage.

Apart from these illustrative big 'projects', Margaret carried the burden of all the other aspects of the Parish Council's work. She must have spent several whole days per week on this business in addition to her major involvement in other aspects of village life, notably the now defunct dramatic society, the Players. There are not many of whom it can be said "they made a big and lasting difference". Margaret was one of those who did and the Parish Council wishes to record its gratitude to her for everything. One can reflect on the fact that there have been three chairs in the seven years since she stood down!

The Parish Council sends its deepest condolences to Roger and the family, and hopes that this reflection of Margaret's contributions to the village might provide some comfort.

Letter from Westminster



SAL's bi-monthly epistle from our MP, Victoria Prentis

I'd like to wish all of my constituents a happy and healthy 2022.

Over the Christmas holidays, my team and I worked hard to support those who have contacted my office. Lots were getting in touch with me about COVID-related concerns, including local vaccination and testing provision. It is good to hear from local public health officials that our vaccine programme has accelerated in the past few weeks with record doses being administered. We now have one of the highest vaccine coverage rates in the country and there continues to be ample capacity across the system. I'd like to take this opportunity to thank all those involved for working with us on this issue.

A fair amount of my time recently has been spent supporting constituents with DVLA renewals, UK Visas and Immigration matters, and Personal Independence Payments (PIP) applications. I was pleased to speak to local residents at my constituency surgery last week. We discussed everything from planning and loan charges to parking and healthcare provision. I always enjoy speaking to constituents and if you have any problems that need resolving, please do get in touch with my office by emailing *victoria.prentis.mp@parliament.uk* It is often quicker to resolve problems virtually or on the phone during the Parliamentary week; don't wait for a surgery.

January can be a challenging time for many businesses in hospitality and leisure as sales slow after the Christmas period. The rapid spread of the Omicron variant has caused added uncertainty for business owners. I have been signposting those who have got in touch to the additional support made available by the Chancellor last month. One-off grants of up to £6,000 per premises will be awarded to businesses in hospitality and leisure. The cost of Statutory Sick Pay for Covid-related absences for small and medium-sized employers will also be covered.

As the weather gets colder and more time is spent inside, it is important that everyone is able to keep warm and well. Vulnerable households can receive financial support through the Winter Fuel Payment and Cold Weather Payments. Additionally, most energy providers offer a Warm Home Discount to those eligible. Residents who need any energy-related advice can get in touch with Better House Better Health, a longstanding and local service in Oxfordshire, on 0800 107 0044.

The New Year can bring great optimism, but it can equally be a lonely and difficult time for some. People can reach out to the Bicester Community Support Service on 01865 897105 should they need support. They provide a range of activities and services to help people to stay healthy, independent and engaged.

For older residents, a friendly chat on the phone can make all the difference. Age UK Oxfordshire's Phone Friends telephone service is a brilliant way for those who are isolated to stay connected. 20,000 phone calls are made each year to over 400 isolated people in our community. Constituents can get in touch by ringing 0345 450 1276.

Before Christmas, I had the pleasure of calling in to David and Lesley Thompson's coffee morning in Launton. The morning was organised to raise funds and awareness for the Bicester Good Neighbour Scheme. This fantastic voluntary organisation arranges free support and friendship for older people in Bicester and nearby villages. The group are always looking for more volunteers. If you have time and are interested in volunteering, do call them on 07849 799 530.

The past 23 months have been an incredibly challenging time for us all. But it has shown us how important community really is. Thank to you all of my constituents who continue to care and support their friends and neighbours. It is wonderful to read constituents' emails when they share these positive community stories with me and I hope this spirit of kindness continues.

"Since singing is so good a thing, I wish all men would learn to sing" William Byrd – 1588 – in 2022 obviously, for 'all men', read everyone!

I precis and paraphrase here a few findings from a major study by Chorus America. People who sing in choirs are: better team players, have better social skills, are strong contributors to their communities; accept criticism better; if children, they get better grades and enhanced self confidence. People can think they can't sing or are put off at school. Very often this is wrong. We have a welcoming, unauditioned choir in Steeple Aston (SA Choral Society). Why not give it a try? The Gardening Spot

'Be Prepared'. Not just a motto for Boy Scouts!

Dig, dig, dig, not dob, dob, dob, could be the motto for all us gardeners, although February is maybe not the best month to be turning soil over in your garden. But it is time to make a start on preparing the garden for 2022.

This is basically the time to do all those jobs which you might have done earlier, but have been left for whatever reason. For the vegetable plot, if you haven't already dug it over, then there is no time to lose. Add organic matter if you can as this will enhance the structure of your soil and plants will reward you later in the year. Talking of vegetables, decide which potatoes you are going to grow and place them on egg trays or similar, in a cool room to chit. This will encourage a good start when you plant them out in March or April.

Alternatively, you could put a few in black, plastic bags or large pots and place them in the greenhouse for an early crop. All you need for this is a general-purpose compost, about three potatoes buried halfway down the container and water as necessary. Seed potatoes can be purchased from any reputable garden centre or online if you wish. The beauty of going to a garden centre is you can select the potatoes yourself. Ideally, go for ones around the size of an egg, with no blemishes and firm. Just make sure they don't get frosted. Whilst in the greenhouse, consider sowing a few salad crops such as Little Gem lettuce or Rocket and for the enthusiastic tomato grower, now is the time to think about sowing your favourite tomato variety.

On a dry day when not frosty, give the edges of your lawn a trim as that will in turn emphasise the borders and the lawn once you start to cut the grass next month. It is also time to tidy up the shrubs such as clematis, wisteria, hydrangea, buddleia and many of the evergreen shrubs. Plant some summer flowering bulbs in readiness to brighten the flower borders. We always associate spring with bulbs, daffodils, crocus, hyacinth, but there are many lovely summer bulbs, which although usually planted in the Autumn, if you missed that slot, early spring provides another opportunity. Allium makes a fabulous display and mixes so well with many popular plants. If planted in February, Alliums will flower in late spring and early summer. Alliums are easy to grow and once established return reliably each year.

As I said earlier, it is time to 'be prepared'. Check your mower to make sure the cutting blades are sharp and the engine actually starts. Give your garden tools a good clean and wipe over with some light oil to protect them from rust. Give your pots and seed trays a good clean and wash them out with a mild solution of Jeyes Fluid or similar. If you have the skill, and it is not that difficult, make a cold frame in readiness for hardening-off the plants that come out of the greenhouse, but need some protection later this spring. Keep an eye on any outside taps and protect them from frosts. Much cheaper than calling out a plumber to repair a burst pipe!

Don't forget the wild birds, as any seeds from last year are fast diminishing. We have a bird feeder about six metres from our kitchen window and every day we watch flocks of finches, blue tits and our resident robin.

Now just to finish, I will tell you about a misadventure I experienced the other day. My wife and I were out walking in our garden and admiring the snowdrops as they peered up through the ground. As luck would have it a bird flew over us and left his calling card on my freshly laundered coat. When I showed it to my wife, she quickly responded without blinking an eyelid, "Well you know they sing for most folk!" There must be a moral in that story, but I have yet to work it out.

Happy gardening and enjoy the longer days. Spring is just around the corner.

Parish Council Meeting Notes



The last Parish Council meeting was on Zoom because the heating in the Sports and Recreation Centre wasn't working that evening and the thought of doors and windows open on a very cold night in January was unappealing to all. But by law the meeting has to be in person so the Councillors met again the following day to ratify what they agreed at the Zoom meeting the evening before. The heating was working the next night so I am unlikely to get my wish that the February meeting will be held on Zoom as well.

The meeting began with the new Parish Councillor, Angharad Lloyd-Jones, being welcomed to the Parish Council. Angharad and her husband have lived in the village for two years and they have two young children of which the oldest is at Dr Radcliffe's school. She has worked in business development in charities and the creative industries and is hoping her fundraising experience will be useful to the Parish Council.

The Councillors discussed how often hedges need cutting and the consensus was only every three years. They had looked at the hedge in front of Lawrence Fields, which was cut back substantially last year, and agreed it did not need doing again this year.

The Parish Council have had a very generous offer of a gift of the orchard at the bottom of Water Lane. A group of eight villagers have offered to look after it on our behalf and the only issue now is to check if the boundary walls and fences or trees need attention. Then, hoorah, we should all have a community orchard and I know from being offered some fruit by the generous donor many years ago that there is a memorably delicious eating apple tree there. Potentially the most expensive thing is if the wall by the pavement should need repair, but last time this was necessary it was paid for by Oxfordshire's Highways because the ground on the orchard

side of the wall is below the pavement and Highways were concerned about safety if it collapsed.

The Parish Council is setting up a public meeting to carry forward their interest in climate change and environmental matters. Everyone will be welcome and those individuals who have already expressed an interest in being involved will be individually invited. It is hoped that the group will include a Parish Councillor and will report back to the Councillors with recommendations for action (or inaction) as appropriate.

The next discussion was about how the village should celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. There is unlikely to be any external financial assistance, though it is possible that we might be able to attach a party onto the back of another village activity. The Councillors are holding a public meeting on 12 February at 10.00am and hoping that villagers will come with ideas for celebrating.

Our District Councillor Mike Kerford-Byrnes told us that Cherwell had not suffered all the cuts they had expected with the result that Cherwell has a little spare money for next year. But the cuts expected next year will probably happen the following year instead so Cherwell has decided not to alter their expenditure next year in order to have a small cushion for when the cuts materialise.

Our Council Tax bills will increase this year. The local element (controlled by our Parish Council) will increase by about 8%, the Cherwell element will increase by £5 per Band D home and there will be an addition for extra care for the elderly. Also, it is likely Oxfordshire County Council and the police will increase their share as well. Oh dear, it doesn't look good.

Parish Council Meeting Notes



We were told about a meeting between our Councillors and representatives of the Hatch End developers. The idea of the meeting was to try to get the developers to amend their plans to alleviate our concerns, especially about traffic and a pavement. One Councillor described it, rather tersely as "unproductive". The main bone of contention seemed to be the developer's unrealistic assumptions about both traffic generation and a pavement and the effect this would have in the village. It was hoped that Highways could be encouraged to look again at the plans and their probable traffic implications.

A Councillor had noticed that the bottom of one ladder in the Play Area was a bit dodgy. This has been checked and it does need a repair, but it is not dangerous and the Councillors will see if they can mend it themselves. There has been a huge clearance of branches and litter at the lower car park at the Village Hall. This clear up was by Charlotte Clarke and some of her family and it has revealed the true size of the lower car park and enabled the footpaths around the MUGA to be used. A huge thank you to Charlotte and her team.

The gutters on the Sports and Recreation Centre and the Village Hall will be cleaned out shortly. There was a brief discussion of the effectiveness of the 'hedgehogs' that can be used to prevent leaves blocking gutters. Someone said "Oh, that is where the hedgehogs have gone then".

The Councillors grumbled about the leaves on Water Lane and whether Highways sweep them up on a regular schedule. The Clerk said she thought the leaf sweeping was random. There were also grumbles about Gigaclear, which was described as "a law unto themselves". Gigaclear has offered to install high-speed broadband in the Village Hall with it being free

for the first year. Apparently, this offer applies to one building only and the Councillors were told the signal would not reach to the Pre-School or to the Sports and Recreation Centre from the Village Hall. The Councillors decided to find out about alternative providers and Gigaclear's charges after the first year before making any decision.

Then the Councillors got to the saddest part of the meeting with memories of Margaret Mason and her 20 years as Chair of the Parish Council. The Councillors have written separately about her elsewhere. I was Parish Clerk for two stints while the official Parish Clerk had children so I had an excellent view of her contribution. She was invariably kind, helpful and astonishingly balanced. I never saw her do or say anything self-seeking or biased. We all owe her a great debt of gratitude and her overwhelming humanity will be much missed.

Parish Council meetings are normally held on the third Monday in the month, but in April this would be on Easter Monday. An alternative date, possibly a week later, was discussed. An upside of a later date for the Parish Council would be that the May SAL would go to the printers before the meeting so could not include any contribution from me. I am waiting to see what they decide to do, and implicitly what they think of the value of my report.

HAVE YOU EVER DEEN TO?

A Magistrates' Court?

Most people are law-abiding and accept the fact that society functions best when the Rule of Law is respected. However, we also know that it's easy to break the law and end up in court before the Beak, as magistrates used to be called somewhat cheekily.

Did you know that 95% of all criminal cases begin and end in Magistrates' Court? The other 5% are sent 'up' to higher courts – Crown Court, Court of Appeal, etc. Many of the 95% of cases are what might be seen as minor infringements of the law, but even so the outcomes of pleading guilty or being found guilty of an offence don't seem minor to the person concerned and the ramifications can cause difficulties for years ahead. Any one of us can find ourselves being summoned to court, but despite the startling number of cases which pass through magistrates' courts each year I think many people have only a hazy idea of what happens. The Courts Service – the system of how misdemeanours and disputes are dealt with in this country – is not generally something which the public spend much time thinking about or debating fiercely!

Business in a magistrates' court can be unexciting, but it can also be dramatic, amusing, tense, complex or distressing. It's nothing like the depictions of justice one sees on television. Contrary to what many think, magistrates are not legally qualified, but are ordinary members of the population who volunteer. Yes, there is a lot of training – training in how to approach cases, in keeping an open mind, in diversity, in how to listen to evidence and in how to make fair and reasoned decisions. There's also training in sentencing with a strong emphasis on consistency and sticking to sentencing guidelines. Dating from 1361 when the magistracy was first recorded as an organised adjunct to peacekeeping (the name Justices of the Peace was first used then), with numerous adaptations and changes over the 600+ years, this is the most ancient office still functioning in society today. It enshrines the principle that a person should be dealt with by his/her equals.

After 36 years as a magistrate (alongside a 'proper' job – you don't get paid to sit in court!) you won't find it surprising that I care a great deal about the enormous reduction in the number of magistrates' courts so that it's difficult and costly for people to get to court. Justice can seem remote and even unimportant – not a good message to give to young people especially. I wonder whether increases in violent crime or knife crime could be traced in part to the diminution of face-to-face, local justice? Of course, increases in technology can help to reduce the time taken to deal with, for example, dozens of speeding offences, but it does distress me that there is now only one magistrates' court serving the whole of Oxfordshire.

The erosion of magistrates' courts and the service they have provided for 600+ years is surely something which should not lightly be put to one side. It's several years since I retired from the Bench (you had to leave when you were 70), but even then we were witnessing an increase in police powers alongside reductions in, for example, the Probation Service. Is it right for the arresting agency also to be the sentencers?

Why not go and see magistrates' courts in action and give this issue some thought? Public spectators are free to observe most business in these courts – only youth courts are closed courts (so perhaps best to avoid Wednesdays as some of Oxford's five courtrooms are likely to be dealing with Youth Business).

Oxford Magistrates Court operates from Monday to Friday 9.00am to 5.00pm and in present circumstances anyone watching proceedings is required to wear a mask and observe social distancing. The court is in Speedwell Street, off St Aldates, OX1 1RZ. There is no parking, so you will need to walk from the Westgate car park or take a Park and Ride bus. I don't promise drama and sometimes the law seems to progress very slowly, but it is an interesting experience and there's much to talk about after many a court sitting.



End of an era as Edwina retires from SAL

The committee of Steeple Aston Life were very sorry to say farewell to Edwina Kinch, who retired at the January AGM after a long association with the magazine stretching back to the 1980s.

Members expressed their grateful thanks to Edwina for all her work over the years, commemorated in a special SAL leaving card. In their farewell comments, members paid tribute to Edwina's excellent chairmanship, her kindness, her efficiency and her charm. Her long experience and her knowledge of village life over many years have proved invaluable.

As one member said, "You must be so proud of SAL's development from humble beginnings to the amazing publication it is today – all down to you."

Steeple Aston Life started in 1973 as a Parish Council initiative under the guidance of George Ennis, the headmaster at Dr Radcliffe's Primary School, and Paul O'Sullivan, who was the first editor. The O'Sullivan family produced the magazine for its first ten years.

In 1983 responsibility for the magazine was transferred to a committee. Edwina took on responsibility for production and collation for five years before taking on the role of editor in 1988. When she finally retired in 2013 after editing more than 300 monthly issues, she became Chair of the SAL Committee.

In her final editorial on SAL's 40th birthday Edwina wrote "I find it difficult to believe that my first issue was published in January 1988, 25 and a half years ago! I have enjoyed my time as editor; contributors have become friends and many changes have come along – in particular the computer revolution. The support of the committee has been constant and SAL has developed into a real community asset, some thirty people now being involved. With a touch of sadness I hand the baton over to Cathy."

Now Cathy Lawday takes up the story. She writes: "I have done a few scary things in my life: glacier climbing in New Zealand, or having brain surgery whilst awake spring to mind. But taking over the editorship of Steeple Aston Life in 2013 was possibly the most scary of all! I had only lived in the village for a couple of years and had recently joined the choral society. One evening at choir rehearsal, the pleasant woman sitting next to me asked if I would be interested in taking over from her as editor of the village magazine. Without too much thought, I said 'yes'. After all, I had editing and writing experience in my professional life, so it couldn't be that hard, could it?

"Then I discovered there was a committee that I had to answer to and that the chair of the committee was Edwina, who had lived here for many, many years, and was a stalwart of the church, a flower arranger, a farmer's wife, a most respected and loved figure in the village. In addition, she had done the job for over a quarter of a century, had edited over 300 issues of the magazine, and would be present at all the meetings. I began to get nervous. What on earth had I taken on? How could I follow that? I didn't know my way round the village institutions and traditions. I didn't even know who Richard Preston was!


"I need not have worried. Edwina was encouraging, kindly, helpful, and above all, very supportive. Several times she quelled lively discussion at committee meetings with a quiet but authoritative "the editor must do as she sees best". She was always appreciative of changes that I introduced, and was generous with praise and encouragement. I could not have had a more helpful mentor and she made sure that my 6½ years as editor were both enjoyable and satisfying. She was full of praise for the special 500th issue and I was particularly pleased that we were able to include on its back cover a colour photo of Edwina's winning entry in the Horticultural Society Spring Show – a flower display based on the theme of The 500th issue of SAL."

For many people in the village, Edwina is the matriarch of SAL. Almost since its inception in 1973 she has been at the helm, either as editor or chair, helping the magazine to facilitate and to reflect village life and making sure 'the Life' adds to the very real sense of community which is at the heart of Steeple Aston.

Others in the village may have good memories of working with Edwina over the years. If so, please do send them to the Editor for publication in forthcoming issues of SAL.

Meanwhile I have been elected to take over the chair from Edwina. It is a cliché, but nonetheless true, that she will be a very hard act to follow!



An update on the Chicken Sheds

On 2nd December 2021, Cherwell District Council's Planning Committee discussed the application to redevelop the Chicken Sheds (officially Hatch End Industrial Estate). I was invited to speak, as Chair of Middle Aston Parish Meeting, and Mike Kerford-Byrnes, one of our District Councillors, made an impassioned and influential contribution to the debate.

Whilst the developers have made some significant and welcome changes to the proposed appearance and configuration of the site, a very serious issue remains: the volume of additional traffic that will be generated and its risk to road safety, particularly in relation to Dr Radcliffe's Primary School. It is our contention that the Highways Team at Oxfordshire County Council has accepted at face value the developers' assumption that there will be few additional journeys to the site and failed to recognise the dangerous situation that can already be seen every school day at drop-off and pickup times.

Please excuse a short diversion into the history of the site. In 1996, an application to change its use from a chicken hatchery to a small industrial estate was refused by CDC, on grounds of highway safety. A renewed application in 1997 was granted, but with the very exceptional provision that each and every change of tenant or specific use in any unit on the site required CDC's prior permission, on grounds of highway safety. As we all know, there has been no improvement in the condition of the road in the intervening years and traffic volumes have increased.

At the Planning Meeting it was noted that the Highways Team, in its statutory consultation submissions in July and October 2021, had imposed an obligation on the developers to create a footpath along Fir Lane from the school to the entrance to the site. This looked like an acknowledgement of the safety issue and a helpful if partial remedy. However, in November 2021 a further submission removed this obligation, in exchange for the creation of a footpath wholly within the development site. No-one could explain, at the meeting or indeed subsequently, how this would increase pedestrian safety on Fir Lane.

The Planning Committee resolved, on 2nd December, to defer a decision on the application for three months, for further consideration. So what has happened to date?

- Richard MacAndrew, Martin Lipson and I met the developers on 23rd December to see whether there was any scope to amend their proposals to help address our concerns. Sadly, the discussions did not result in significant progress.
- We have been made aware that the OCC Highways Team has been asked to re-examine the developer's calculations on increased traffic flow.
- I have asked the Team to explain the rationale of the withdrawal of the obligation to create a footpath on Fir Lane, in exchange for an internal site footpath. So far, the only explanation offered is that the developers baulked at the cost of the obligation.

The matter will next be considered by the CDC Planning Committee on 10th March 2022. If, like me, you feel that the road safety issue remains as a grave concern, please do contact our local District and County Councillors, whose details are in the Directory on page 2, to express your view.



Church Matters



Six months before her coronation, the Queen asked the people of the United Kingdom and the Commonwealth to: "Pray that God may give me the wisdom and strength to carry out the solemn promises I shall be making, and that I may faithfully serve Him and you, all the days of my life."

As this month sees the 70th anniversary of the Queen's accession to the throne, I think most of us are agreed that this prayer has indeed been answered.

Her Majesty has been an amazing example and role model all her life – but like all such, sometimes we need to remember one or two important things. It's right to honour, respect and be thankful for those who shine a light in this life for us. And the Queen certainly has done that for a very long time, as do (in their way) artists, celebrities, sportspeople, teachers, parents and all sorts of others.

But all are just people. We should never place too much weight on another, too much expectation, too much demand. No one is perfect. As the Queen said in one of her Christmas broadcasts:

"Although we are capable of great acts of kindness, history teaches us that we sometimes need saving from ourselves – from our recklessness or our greed."

It's OK to be thankful for the example and life of someone who is amazing – but not perfect. We don't have to pretend. We should just be grateful, and recognise that greatness isn't about being perfect - it's about being as human as anyone else, and doing good for others even though sometimes others are focusing on our faults.

Her Majesty, living in the spotlight as she does, has found her way of dealing with all that – and it's a pretty good way. She went on to say in that same Christmas broadcast: "God sent into the world a unique person – neither a philosopher nor a general (important though they are) but a Saviour, with the power to forgive. Forgiveness lies at the heart of the Christian faith. It can heal broken families, it can restore friendships and it can reconcile divided communities. It is in forgiveness that we feel the power of God's love."

There are times in all our families, friendships and communities that we need such an example, such power, such forgiving love. The Queen is quite right. It does not belong to the Church or to Christians – it is the gift of God. And as we celebrate Her Majesty's long reign, perhaps we might also open our hearts afresh to the Lord whom she serves, and pray that we too might receive (after her example) such forgiving love for one another.

The Platinum Jubilee

The coronation of Queen Elizabeth II took place on 2nd June 1953. So why are we celebrating her Platinum Jubilee, marking a reign of 70 years, in 2022?

It is because Elizabeth II became Queen immediately following the death of her father, King George VI, on 6th February 1952. She was 25.

The 16 months between the accession and the coronation allowed for a period of mourning and the enormous amount of preparation needed to organise the ceremony.

The event was televised and more than 20 million people watched the service, outnumbering the radio audience for the first time.
