"Autumn seemed to arrive suddenly that year. The morning of the first of September was crisp and golden as an apple." Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows, by J. K. Rowling.

Do you know what happened on Thursday 3rd September 1752? The answer is 'absolutely nothing'. The date does not exist!

How is this possible? We can put the blame on Julius Caesar. Up to 1752, Britain followed the Julian calendar. However, due to a miscalculation of the solar year by 11 minutes, the calendar had a built-in error of one day every 128 years. This might not sound very much, but it began to affect the date of Easter.

To overcome the problem, the Gregorian calendar was introduced, named after Pope Gregory XIII. This is a solar calendar, based on a year of 365 days divided into 12 months. Each month has 30 or 31 days, with 28 days in February. However, to keep the calendar synchronised with the seasons, an extra day is added to February every four years - almost.

The rules to calculate a leap year are:

- 1. The year must be evenly divisible by four (that is, no fractions);
- 2. However, if the year can also be evenly divisible by 100, it is not a leap year;
- 3. But if the year can be evenly divisible by 400, it is a leap year.

Confused? Well, 1900, 2100, 2200 and 2300 are not leap years, but 2000 and 2400 are leap years. The next leap year is 2024.

The Gregorian calendar was first adopted by France, Italy, Poland, Portugal and Spain in 1582. Britain followed some years later in 1751, but was out of sync with Europe by 11 days. To correct this problem, it was decided that Wednesday 2nd September 1752 would be followed by Thursday 14th September 1752.

There have been stories, probably apocryphal, of civil unrest at this time with rioters demanding, "give us back our eleven days," as if their lives had been shortened.

Incidentally, the Romans associated September with Vulcan, the god of fires, volcanic eruptions and earthquakes. 2000 years later, we call it 'climate change'.

Meals on Wheels

The 'Meals on Wheels' service started in Steeple Aston back in May 1978 and has supported many people during the last 40+ years with hot freshly-prepared meals.

Sadly, lock-down meant that the service had to be stopped. But Jasmine kindly took over during this time and has ever since been supplying meals for those who need it – thank you Jasmin.

During the years of doing Meals on Wheels, bits of extra money came in from the WRVS subsidy (who helped to start it), and when Steeple Aston then went on its own, we kept getting the odd small donations. These small amounts of money were put into a Post Office Savings account and with interest the balance stood at £1157.17. It was in my name, but not my money, so I felt it was right that this money should be used, rather than sit in a savings account.

Several recipients of the meals had used the wonderful services of Katherine House and benefitted from their care. Therefore, I felt that the right thing to do was for this money to go to Katherine House Hospice and I hope that you all feel that I have done the right thing. I have now had confirmation from them that the money has been received. *"How kind of you to support us in this way, thank you! Please extend our gratitude to everyone who kindly donated to the wonderful total, your donation will make a real difference to those that we care for."*

I would like to say a massive thank you to all the loyal helpers, some of whom have done it for as long as I have since we first started!

We are surrounded by choirs, but have one on our doorstep – the Steeple Aston Choral Society. From time to time, I meet people who were told at school that they can't sing! This is usually untrue. Open to all, why not give SACS a try? Rehearsals are Monday nights. There will also be a few opportunities in the future to sing in the church at selected services. More on this next time.

Down the road, we have an internationally-renowned Song Festival. 'Oxford Lieder' is now called the 'Oxford International Song Festival'. The theme this year is 'Art:Song – Images, Words, Music'. This theme aligns the visual arts with poetry and music in a wide variety of ways. "Alongside world-renowned singers and pianists, you'll find colour, fashion, musical manuscripts, artist-poets, artist-composers and more," says Sholto Kynoch – Artistic Director. Running from 13th to 28th October, it is well worth looking at the brochure, listing a cornucopia of riches (*https://oxfordsong.org/*). I've watched this Festival grow over many years, led by my friend Sholto Kynock. He has done wonders!

The Gardening Spot

Is September the beginning or end of a gardener's year?

For some, it is the time to gather in all that remains in the garden, for others it is time to clear the garden of debris, dig over and plan for 2024. I am a great believer in planning ahead, so as we approach the winter months I like to clear the garden, cultivate where possible and introduce as much organic matter as possible before it gets too cold and wet to venture outside.

If you haven't harvested your potatoes, now is the time to dig them up, dry off and store in a cool, dark place where they will not get frosted. Protect any brassicas that are still on your plot, such as Brussels sprouts and cabbage, as our local fan club (pigeons) will almost certainly take a fancy to them if they can get at the crops. Pick apples and store if you have enough. Mine seem to have vanished this year so, sadly, I will have to buy a few Bramleys later this winter.

Now is the time to plant out such flowers as pansies, wallflowers and forget-me-nots ready for next spring. How about planting up a few containers for winter interest such as cyclamen, heucheras, heathers and other plants available in any garden centre or possibly your local supermarket? This is the perfect time of the year to divide clumps of perennials as they will benefit from being split up and provide you with additional free plants.

Bulb planting time is also upon us, so have a look around at the numerous varieties of daffodils you can purchase and start to plant them when the ground is available, along with crocuses, hyacinths and bluebells. Take cuttings from fuchsias, salvias and pelargoniums, as yet again they will provide you with additional plants for your garden completely free!

It is also time to trim your hedges, bringing them to the height you want and neaten them up for the winter. As for lawns, well this year is so different to last year when the grass went a very brown colour – something to do with climate change I was told. If you can, try to remove as much thatch as possible and keep mowing as you never know when the winter weather might arrive and mowing becomes just about impossible. I am not a fan of winter feed on a lawn and would much rather save my money until the spring when the grass is about to rush into action. If you have any bald patches (in the grass, I mean!) and the weather has not turned cold, now is a great time to reseed those patches in readiness for next spring. If you can lay your hands on a scarifier, then they are great at removing thatch and revitalising your lawn, but not essential as a rake will do much the same thing.

I am writing this in the middle of August, so I don't know how the Annual Flower Show went or who won what. What I will tell you, in strictest confidence, is that I have a problem. At the top of my garden I am very fortunate in having a large heap of well-rotted horse manure, mixed regularly with grass mowings and compostable material. So I decided to plant a couple of pumpkin plants on the heap to see what happens. We have had a lot of rain this year and not too much extreme heat, so the pumpkins have done well. I have three pumpkins which I can't lift and the hire of a forklift is just a bit too much. If you see me at the flower show and I have not won first prize with the heaviest pumpkin, it is simply because mine are too big to transport!

When does an apple not taste like an apple?

This may sound like a bad joke, but bear with me for now. Back in the June issue, we reported how 'buying the blossom' was an ingenious way of making money from the natural fruits of the village. The 1881 OS map reveals large segments of land given over to orchards primarily for growing a wide variety of apples, and the railway at nearby Heyford was used for transporting the crop to markets far and wide.

Former village greengrocer Richard Preston recounts how in the 1950s and 60s, many of the gardens that run down to the stream in the centre of the village had apple orchards, some having since disappeared. He recalls Cox's Orange Pippin, Bramley and Blenheim being grown, along with Laxton Fortune, Worcester Pearmain and Lady Sudeley, all widespread in those days.

One of the more unusual varieties was the Nonpareil apple, of which Stephen Switzer wrote in 1724 in *The Practical Fruit Gardener* – "it is no stranger to England; though it might have its origins from France, yet there are trees of them about the Ashtons (Astons) in Oxfordshire, of about a hundred years old, which (as they have by tradition) were first brought out of France and planted by a Jesuit in Queen Mary or Queen Elizabeth's time".

In 1929, writing in *The History of Steeple Aston and Middle Aston*, CC Brookes wrote about this apple stating it "is still a favourite here". With a dull russet colouring, the Nonpareil is one of the oldest varieties of apple, believed by Victorian pomologist Robert Hogg to have originated from France in the 16th century. Its aromatic qualities were much appreciated, more so here than in its country of birth, and it grew best in the south of England. What made it stand out even more was its flavour of pear-drops, an unusual component only present in a small group of apples, including one of its likely descendants, Ashmead's Kernel.

Switzer further promoted it, saying "the lovely russet of its coat, so much improved if exposed to the sun, that even the colour equals the finest Russets, and the taste is incomparably better". When selecting apples for quality, he recommended the coat as a good recommendation – "that the pulp and skin be not tough, but short and as melting as possible, that the taste be rather sharp than sweet, or an agreeable mixture of both, especially for winter". Those for summer may be indeed of a finer sugared juice because they are for eating, but he said "give me the sharpness of the Nonpareil for winter rather than the beauty or sweetness of any of the much-magnified French apples".

When it comes to collecting and preserving fruit, there are many ingenious means of gathering and storing them. A book from the 1940s donated to SAVA by Mel and Irene Smith entitled *Fruit and Vegetable Preserving and War-time Gardening*, by John Stoney, details methods of preserving apples. The firm, late varieties should be selected for drying, cut into quarters or sliced, and could be prepared using a peeler, corer and slicer similar to a mincing machine. The slices are arranged on trays, placed in a slow oven to start removing the moisture, raising the temperature until they are leathery and stored in a dry area in tight fitted boxes lined with grease-proof paper. For apple rings, fruits are dipped into a salt solution, then removed and placed in trays at a high temperature gradually reducing it. Apple rings typically take around three hours, sometimes longer, turning occasionally, but whole apples may take up to 8-10 hours to dry. Steeple Aston had its own apple and potato store located in Water Lane and the door is still visible today, although it has now been converted as part of a residential dwelling.

For those interested, the village apple press will be available on selected dates in the autumn for villagers to use – just bring along your apples and bottles. Who knows what tasty juice will emerge!

The Cricket Report



Blenheim Park....

Winning the toss, stand-in skipper Phil Chesser chose to bowl first. Starting the innings with only nine players, as Nick Foster and Olly Doggett tried to work out what to do with their dogs, who weren't allowed into the ground, the ever-steady Alain Michaelis and debutant Ben Evans opened the bowling. Without any consultation with the captain or bowler, Alec Michaelis and Dan Milner positioned themselves at silly mid-off and silly mid-on, only for Alec to rapidly take two catches off Ben's bowling to leave Blenheim Park on 6 for 2.

A beauty from Ben (3-18 off 6) clean-bowled the opposition number four for a duck, making the score 9 for 3. A partnership of over 80 runs then followed, with Steeple looking unlikely to take a wicket despite some steady bowling from Adrian Downing (0-28 off 7) and Paul Longman (0-24 off 7), until a chaotic run out left Blenheim on 95-4. Another strong partnership of 48 was ended by Alain Michaelis (a superb 1-16 off 7) who, inspired by his captain's decision to change his bowling end, clean bowled the Blenheim number five for 77 off the last ball of his spell. The innings finished with some huge hits from their number seven (where was he earlier?!), leaving Blenheim on 156-5 off their 35 overs.

Nick Foster and Olly Doggett opened SACC's innings. Olly was out early, which was a good thing as his dog was stuck in the car, whilst Nick had persuaded the girls at the gate to look after his. This brought Alec Michaelis to the crease and he scored an imperious 74 in a partnership of 118 (second highest in SACC history for the 2nd wicket) with Nick, before being clean bowled. A few quick runs by Merrik Baggalay helped Nick cruise to a beautiful 61 not out and see Steeple through to a victory by 7 wickets with over 10 overs left.

Great & Little Tew...

With skipper Doggett winning the toss and opting to bowl first, SACC took to the field. Opening the bowling with Ben Evans and Paul Longman, Steeple got off to a quick start with new bowling star Ben taking an early wicket, caught at deep gully by the skipper. Tew's number three – father of the two opening batsmen – then took things into his own hands disrespectfully smacking the ball all over the park before being bowled by a relieved and once again happy Paul Longman (1-30 off 5 overs). A very rapid short spell by Hector Higgins (0-3 off 3 overs), which saw only one run off the bat, and some tight bowling by Tom Chesser (1-19 off 5 overs) totally dried up the runs for Tew. An excellent spell by Pete Higgins (2-17 off 5 overs) and yet more wickets for Ben (3-22 off 5 overs) restricted Tew further. However, a quick-fire innings by Tew skipper James Churchill, who chanced his arm somewhat and got away with it, took Tew to 116-7 off their 25 overs. Special mention should go to Steeple's fielders in the deep, in particular Hector Higgins and Nick Foster who saved many runs despite occasionally confusing each other with their enthusiasm.

A quick turnaround saw Steeple open with Nick Foster and Arthur Higgins. With Nick falling uncharacteristically cheaply, Olly (30) joined Arthur (48) at the crease for a very entertaining and excellent partnership, which did include the spilling of one of the easiest catches one will ever see. Olly's dismissal saw Steeple's most crock players at the crease – skipper Nige failing to trouble the scorers and Jon Scotchbrook improving his season's average slightly with a scratchy 9. Fortunately, Olly and Arthur – caught very well in the deep just shy of his 50 – had set the foundations and enabled Tom Chesser (12 not out) to take us to a four-wicket victory with around 5 overs to spare – another good win for the mighty SACC.

A little something different this month from AD&DPS – a guide to Street Photography as presented by Peter Crane at our Club night this month.

Being a Street Photographer: Peter thought Street Photography is a bit like fishing – you are out to catch a moment or chance event. You need to be alert and not switched off. You need to have a little confidence and a great deal of patience. By carrying his camera by his side in order to not bring attention to himself and by blending in, he can capture great shots by being at the right place at the right time.

Peter demonstrated:

Relationship of colours together.

Relationship of shapes – buildings, graffiti, road signs, posters etc. having a connection with people in the image. Juxtaposition of signage with subjects – people with the many signs and text around us in our surroundings. Similarities of people to their surroundings – people with the background.

Reflective surfaces to shoot images - use of windows, mirrors and puddles.

Atmospheric Silhouettes – use of street lighting at night

What we learnt:

Be patient. Be observant and quick to respond. That taking photographs of people in different settings, when they are going about their daily routines or adventures, needs to be done with respect and consideration. It is the observational glimpse of other's lives, without ridicule, that is the strength of this artistic form.

Our slideshow of members' images titled 'On the edge' closed the evening. There was a variety of interpretations from mountain edges, cliff edges, the edge of time and even 'On a knife edge'.
