

The object of the Society is to encourage and improve the cultivation of fruit, flowers and vegetables in the district.

Society Regulations for Exhibitors

- 1 All produce for exhibition must be the property of the exhibitor and entered in the owner's name and (except in the case of Floral Art) must have been in his/her possession at least two months previous to the date of the show.
- 2 Entry forms together with entry fees (Adult's classes 30p per exhibit entered and Children's classes 10p per exhibit) must be delivered by 7pm on the Wednesday previous to the show, or a double entry fee will be charged. The entry fee includes payment for membership of the Society for one year.

Entries for the planter and the hanging basket must be in by Thursday 1st August to allow the judges time to visit all the entrants. Judging will take place within a week of this date.

All entry forms to Victoria Clifton, Bluebell Cottage, Middle Aston (07817 025948) or Rebecca Lewin, Lansdowne House, Heyford Road, Steeple Aston (07768 904841). Late entries close at 7pm on the Friday before the show and entry forms must be delivered to Victoria Clifton, Bluebell Cottage, Middle Aston OX25 5PZ.

PLEASE NOTE! – NO LATE ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED AFTER 7PM ON THE FRIDAY PRIOR TO THE SHOW

- 3 Exhibits marked * in the schedule require a plate or dish which must be provided by the exhibitor.
- 4 Exhibits must be delivered to the Committee at the show not later than 10.15am on the day of the show and they may not be removed until after the presentation of the prizes. The marquee will be cleared at 10.30am for judging.
- 5 The Trophies will be distributed at 5pm on the day of the show preceded by an auction of produce. Any produce for auction may be placed on the auction table by 4.30pm

Please note! Prize money will be available for collection from the treasurer from 3.30pm until 5pm inside or close to the marquee. Any monies not collected by 5pm on the day will be donated to the Society. A signature will be required and under-16s must be accompanied by their parent or guardian.

- 6 Any exhibitor attempting to gain prizes dishonestly or wilfully violating any of the Rules and Regulations of the Society shall forfeit all claims to all prizes. Any complaint must be made to the show secretary before 3pm on the day of the show.
- 7 The judges shall withhold any prize or points if the exhibits are not deemed of sufficient merit and in all cases their decision shall be final.
- **8** The Committee will not accept responsibility for any damage or loss and exhibits are accepted only on this condition.
- **9** In the event of doubt or dispute arising as to the interpretation of these regulations, the decision of the Committee shall be final.
- **10** Exhibitors are requested not to exhibit items in Divisions 6, 7 and 9 that have previously been shown at a Steeple Aston Horticultural Society Show.
- 11 Please note: exhibitors may only enter one entry in each class in Divisions 1, 2, 3, 4 8 and 10 with the exception of class 18. Exhibitors can enter more than one entry in each class in Divisions 5, 6, 7 and 9, but only one entry per exhibitor can be placed.
- 12 Division 2 Class 27: collection of any vegetables (5 distinct kinds). N.B. Collections must be of distinct kinds, e.g. it is not permissible to enter both globe and flat onions together, or runner and dwarf beans together. The exhibition value of any kind of vegetable is governed by the difficulty of producing a perfect exhibit. The maximum points attainable for each type of vegetable are as follows:

Chocolate & Vanilla marble loaf (set recipe for class 112)

Ingredients

4 large eggs

225g (8oz) butter, softened

2 tbsp milk

225g (8oz) caster sugar

1/2 tsp vanilla extract

275g (10oz) self-raising flour

1 1/2 level tbsp cocoa powder

2 level tsp baking powder

2 tbsp hot water

For the Icing: 25g (1oz) butter; 15g (1/2oz) cocoa powder, sifted; 1-2 tbsp milk; 100g (4oz) Icing sugar, sifted; about 25g (1oz) white chocolate melted.

Equipment needed: 900a (2lb) loaf tin. 17 x 9 x 9cm base measurement and electric whisk/

Equipment needed: 900g (21b) loar tin, 17 x 9 x 9cm base measurement and electric whisk/mixer

Preheat oven 160°C/ Fan 140oC/gas 3. Lightly grease a 900g loaf tin and line with a wide strip of non-stick baking parchment to go up the wide sides and over the base of the tin.

Measure the butter, sugar, flour, baking powder, eggs, milk and vanilla extract Into a large bowl and beat with a hand-held electric mixer for about 2 minutes, until well blended. Spoon half the mixture Into another bowl and set aside.

In a small bowl, mix the cocoa powder and hot water together until smooth. Allow to cool slightly, then add to one of the bowls of cake mixture, mixing well until evenly blended.

Spoon the vanilla and chocolate cake mixture randomly Into the prepared tin until all of the mixture is used up, and gently level the surface. Bake for 50 mins - 1 hour, until the cake is well risen, springy to touch and beginning to shrink away from the sides of the tin. Allow to cool in the tin for a few minutes, then turn out onto a wire rack, peel off the lining paper and leave to cool completely.

To make the Icing, melt the butter In a small pan, add the cocoa powder, stir to blend and cook gently for 1 minute. Stir In the milk and Icing sugar, then remove from the heat and mix thoroughly. If necessary, leave the Icing on one side, stirring occasionally, to thicken. Spread the cold cake evenly with the Icing, then drizzle the melted white chocolate over the top. Leave to set.
