
Editorial

RAISE THE ROOF - HERE WE GO!

Once more, may we sincerely thank everyone who has so kindly donated towards repairing the church roof. You are all so very kind.

We have just received a promise from a large national fund that means we are nearly there! In fact, we are confident enough to ask our builder to start in September 2025, so that we can have a weather-proof roof over the Lady Chapel and the Vestry for the next winter. We'll be able to dispatch those many buckets under the vestry roof - hooray!

However, from our little display in the church porch, you may have seen that there is still need. We now have £87,000: some from our own funds, some in real gifts and some in promised gifts from major Trust funds. We still need more for ancillary things, such as funding for the various surveys and architect's fees etc, and the ever-important factor that, until the roof tiles are removed, nobody knows whether beams need changing. These would need to be oak to last the next 200 years, which are very expensive.

So, although this is a wonderful moment full of thanks and positive thoughts, we would still be more than grateful if anyone would like to help us financially to achieve this as a whole, for the sake of the parish, the village and our children's children. The autumn will be interesting at church, to say the least. Watch this space!

CONSULTATION on proposed speed limits – A4260 corridor & Adjacent roads (Kidlington to Banbury)

We're asking for your views on the proposal to introduce new <u>lower speed limits</u> on & along the A4260 corridor (including selected adjacent roads) between Kidlington at the south & Banbury to the north. Specifically, the proposals comprise of the following reduced speed limits:

- 1. 30mph speed limits on the A4260 Oxford Road at Bodicote & Banbury.
- 2. 40mph speed limits on the:
- A4260 Oxford/Banbury Road at Hopcrofts Holt,
- B4030 at Hopcrofts Holt,
- A420 Banbury Road at Shipton-on-Cherwell, and
- A4095 Bunkers Hill & Upper Campsfield Road at Shipton-on-Cherwell.
- 3. 50mph speed limits on the:
- A4260 Banbury Road at Shipton-on-Cherwell,
- A4260 Banbury Road at Rousham,
- A4260 Oxford Road at Steeple Aston,
- A4260 Oxford Road at North Aston.
- A4260 Banbury Road at Deddington, and
- B4027 at Tackley.
- 4. 60mph speed limit on the A4260 Oxford Road (Northbound carriageway only) at Middle Aston.

The proposals are being put forward - following investigations by Officers - as part of the Council's 'Vision Zero' strategy, which seeks to work on a safe system approach to reducing fatal and severe injuries to road casualties. The Council proposes to reduce vehicle speeds to safer levels for road users, including pedestrians, cyclists, equestrians, motorcyclists, and all motorists.



Letter from Westminster



SAL's regular epistle from our MP, Sean Woodcock

As always, I've been busy representing and working for the constituents of Banbury. I've been speaking up in Parliament about various issues affecting local people, including overcrowding on Chiltern Railways' trains. Constituents have regularly told me about the issues they've faced regarding poor service on Chiltern trains to or from Banbury, so I was pleased to hear that the Department of Transport is working with Chiltern Railways to improve procurement and refurbish carriages. I followed this up more recently in a meeting with the Rail Minister, Lord Hendy, to discuss overcrowding further, and to follow up on the progress that the Department for Transport are making. I will continue to monitor these issues and stay informed about any future updates.

I have spoken in the Chamber on the provision of youth services, given that 19/25 of Oxfordshire's youth services were closed under the Conservatives. I later met with the Distraction Community Youth Project to discuss youth work in Banbury and the local area. My other contributions have included the use of drones, where I was pleased to hear that drone development will be supported, increasing Britain's security. I also welcomed the news that 2,017 more children in the Banbury constituency will start receiving free school meals from September, which is set to make a real difference in regard to attainment, behaviour and attendance of children in our schools.

In the constituency, I have been out and about in Souldern, Charlbury and Hook Norton speaking to residents, and holding regular surgeries listening to constituents' issues and offering support and advice. Speaking to local people always shapes the issues I champion, such as writing to Sainsbury's to ask them to reconsider their decision to shut the customer toilets in the Banbury store on Oxford Road. I heard of the difficulties faced by constituents as a result of this decision, so I will continue to monitor this, and hope that the decision will be reversed. As always, if anyone would like to book a time to meet with me, you can email me at sean.woodcock.casework@parliament.uk and my team will set up an appointment.

I have been assisting constituents with other issues raised, including helping to get a blocked sewage pipe fixed that left them unable to use the toilet in their house, and arranging support from the Home Office to allow my terminally ill constituent's daughter to visit from Pakistan. I have been speaking to and meeting with local groups, businesses and venues to hear their ideas and understand their concerns. Through meeting with these groups, I have been able to understand the challenges faced, see their hard work in action and realise how I can provide increased support moving forward. I have also held meetings with local groups and stakeholders, including a Policing and Crime Roundtable meeting, engaging with Thames Valley Police and other stakeholders to hear solutions on, and understand how to better tackle crime in our towns and villages. Additionally, I have met with representatives of the Country, Land and Business Association, National Farmers' Union and NE Cotswold Farmers' Cluster, alongside local farmers, to discuss issues and how I can offer further support. This is on top of attending a roundtable meeting with the National Farmers Union to understand these issues in more detail.

Not in the top 50? They should have been!

In 2023, *Rolling Stone* magazine listed the 50 best Canadian singers and bands of all time. All the usual suspects were there from Joni Mitchell, Leonard Cohen and four-fifths of The Band, through to Celine Dion, Avril Lavigne and Justin Bieber. However, three names were not mentioned which should surely have been included in the top 50, if not the top 20, by virtue of outstanding albums.

In 2014, **The Barr Brothers** released the album *Sleeping Operator*, which has been on my playlist ever since. It is a unique, meticulously crafted, warm mix that blends Appalachian sounds with Americana, folk and African rhythms. Their totally original songs use any instruments to hand: harp, banjo, dulcimer, marimba and ngoni. When I saw them earlier this year, they even played the spokes of a bicycle wheel! The result is not a jumbled mishmash, but a wonderfully eclectic album packed with beautifully constructed, original songs which sound like nothing you will hear elsewhere. Despite somewhat opaque lyrics, from the simple instrumental opening of *Static Orphans*, through to the gorgeous hymn-like finale of *Please Let Me Let It Go*, the album is a totally original, rich melodic feast.

Come Morning is the 2022 release by **The Bros. Landreth**. Drawing on the musical inspirations they grew up listening to – Bonnie Raitt, Little Feat, and Ry Cooder among others – Joey and Dave Landreth have put together a gentle, understated alternative country/folk album that is pure pleasure. Harmonically interesting music, well-crafted lyrics, excellent guitar work and slide solos make an album that is rooted in joy and optimism.







Best of the three, in my opinion, is **Allison Russell**. Her 2021 album, *Outside Child*, creates something beautiful from a shocking upbringing. At fifteen, she fled a decade of abuse by her stepfather and lived on the streets, first in her hometown of Montreal; then in Vancouver where, in her own words, "music saved me". From this harrowing background emerges an astonishingly uplifting album of catharsis, recovery and hope, with a real Americana flavour. Russell plays banjo and clarinet, and is accompanied by an excellent band of musicians, her distinctive voice blending seamlessly with first-class harmony singers. Her lyrics do not spare the listener: *Blood on my shirt, two ripped buttons/Might have killed me that time, oh if I'd let him* but her resilience shines through as in *hy-brazil*, an homage to her Scottish Canadian grandmother:

Though I drowned for ten years, I'm still rising Stronger for my pain and suffering My body was broken but my heart's reborn I'm freer than the sky

If you stream the album and like what you hear, buy the CD. The liner notes contain a brief, illuminating background to each song, and a translation of the occasional verses that are in French.



Profits will go towards the cost of next year's programme of events, outings and speakers.

Wishing all our members, both long-standing and more recent, a sunny and relaxing summer.



THE VALENTINE CLUB

Way back in May (seems like a lifetime ago), we had a very enjoyable, possibly enlightening, talk by Bill King on 'Yesterday's Childhood' rekindling memories of our early days, back as far as the Victorian era. How things have changed, as some decades ago, electricity had only just come to the fore and the idea of playstations or mobile phones were a thing for books of fantasy, or maybe HG Wells. Very noticeably, as Bill came onto toys and pastimes from the 1940s, the audience started to murmur with the talk of, "I had one of those", or "life was simpler in those days".

Only two days later, we were off on the coach to Oakham Treasures in Somerset, and what a treasure this turned out to be. I don't think anyone on the coach had heard of Oakham, let alone visited this amazing place. If you can imagine some very large agricultural barns filled with, well you name it, it was there! Tractors from some of the first to those still being used today. Bridal shops, sweet shops, chemists, haberdashery, grocery and many more, all set out in their original form, with beautiful wooden counters, containers of every description and publicity signs by the hundred, and that is not an exaggeration. To compliment this, there was a superb restaurant serving wonderful, locally produced food at very reasonable cost. All owned and managed by one family, who are responsible for the entire collection.

Our June meeting welcomed Chris, who visited us for the first time and sang songs from the 50s upwards, and later in the month we will have visited The Severn Valley Railway at Kidderminster, starting off with a meal at their restaurant, then boarding a diesel train to Highley, before a return journey by steam.

This month, we are taking a break from the village hall, and will meet at Rousham House for 'high tea' and an opportunity to visit the historic and world-renowned gardens, courtesy of Charles and Angela Cottrell-Dormer. Two days later, we are off again by coach, this time to visit Hatfield House and grounds.

As I pointed out last month, our club is running at capacity of 100 members with a waiting list, but I received this email from a lady a few weeks ago and thought you might like to read this slightly reduced version.

"My husband died two and half years ago so I am finding it tough. I am 80 now, so travelling to Steeple Aston might be tricky, although sometimes I know a bus used to go that way from Adderbury which, at the moment, I can drive to. I used to belong to the Evergreens at Adderbury, but it could not continue after Covid because the methodist church wanted paying for their hall, so it was no longer viable with falling numbers. Then the chapel closed. In Bloxham, there isn't anything like that. The senior citizens only did bingo which I hate. So, there is nowhere for affordable trips or holidays. So, it is really depressing. The Bloxham school stopped the Xmas party and lunch".

This rather sad email provides some evidence that Steeple Aston is a pretty good place to live, even if you are getting that bit older! Thank you to all those people who have decided to join The Cherwell Lottery and support the club, raising well over £1,200 in revenue which makes an enormous difference to what we can do with the club. Although we organise six, or more, day trips, and have some amazing entertainers and speakers, the expenses keep rising. A coach is now around £850 each trip, and good speakers and entertainers do not come cheap, so if you feel like supporting us 'oldies', why not subscribe to The Cherwell Lottery? Simply google

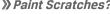

News from your County Councillor – Gareth Epps



A lot has happened in the first month or two since becoming the new County Councillor for The Astons, Deddington and Heyford Park in a redrawn Deddington county division. Thank you to all who took part in the election in whatever way.

The annual meeting of the Council was overshadowed by the terrible news from Bicester of the loss of life of two firefighters and a worker at the Bicester Motion centre. I have signed the book of condolence; the council observed a minute's silence, and there will be opportunities in due course to mark the memory of those involved. The courage and bravery of those who put themselves forward to protect us goes without saying. All our deepest sympathies go to the family and friends of those who didn't make it home after answering the call.

A consultation was launched in June on speed reductions for the A4260 [closing date 4 July]. This forms part of a countywide speed reduction campaign. I am following up on a number of repairs and potential improvements to this as well as repairs to the County's roads. After many years of 'managed decline', every gutter will be cleaned this year, with our area due in the late summer. There is resurfacing scheduled for several locations including by Heyford Station and at Somerton and Heyford Park.

Steeple Aston is one of the luckier villages in the division when it comes to a bus service: the S4 and X4 are well used. A lot of work goes on to try and safeguard and improve bus services, and I have had an early briefing with officers to discuss a number of issues raised during the election. I have been chasing progress on items raised by parish councils and residents.

A recommendation is coming forward to go out to consultation this summer on a time-limited version of the Oxford city traffic filters scheme, using the filter locations as charging points. The main drivers behind the recommendation are to mitigate congestion, as requested very forcefully by the bus companies, and to enhance bus services by the twin benefits of freeing up road space and generating revenue to potentially enhance services further. Additional benefits would include greater safety, more space for walking and cycling, and better air quality. All permits and exemptions are carried over from the approved traffic filters scheme, so that the daily lives of, for example, traders, health workers, blue-badge holders, those with regular medical appointments, etc, will be significantly better.

There is plenty going on that isn't transport. Social care is the biggest spending item; there is interesting work starting on health equality as we look to become a 'Marmot Place'. Efforts continue to address challenges in Special Educational Needs provision, a cause close to my heart.

Dr Radcliffe's School Report



All About Sustainable Palm Oil

What is palm oil?

It's an edible vegetable oil that comes from the fruit of oil palm trees. The scientific name is *Elaeis Guineensis*. Two types of oil can be produced: crude palm oil comes from squeezing the fleshy fruit, and palm kernel, or the stone in the middle of the fruit. Oil palm trees are native to Africa, but were brought to South-East Asia too.

Why is palm oil bad?

Many products contain unsustainable palm oil, where manufacturers commit acts like deforestation and the destruction of animals' habitats in pursuit of their own wealth. Unsustainable palm oil production not only creates greenhouse gases, which accelerates climate change and can cause wildfires, but can also exploit local farmers and even children. Boycotting palm oil entirely is not the solution, as many workers could lose their jobs and possibly not be able to find another one. It doesn't have to be this way.



What is sustainable palm oil?

Palm can be farmed sustainably, producing oil using the lowest environmental impact possible by improving farming techniques and treating farmers fairly. Chester zoo, who is running a campaign for sustainable palm oil, say "the average carbon footprint of sustainable palm oil is 36% lower" than for unsustainable palm oil.



Where can I buy sustainable palm oil?

The Palm oil scan app allows you to scan your favourite products, and learn if they are made using sustainable palm oil.

Examples of products that contain sustainable palm oil are:

- Betty Crocker cake mixes
- Anti Dandruff Caffeine Shampoo
- Divine chocolate

Home Generated Renewable Energy

On Wednesday 18th June, Steeple Aston Environmental Committee organised a talk on solar power and heat pumps. It was attended by 37 (mostly villagers), and given with great passion and enthusiasm by Ian Williams. Ian, a former chartered surveyor, works for Forever Green Energy who operate across the Cotswolds. Hard to distill succinctly 1.5 hours of discussion, but here goes:

- Heat pumps, whether air source or more costly ground source, work best with solar to pay for the electricity, and in modern houses with underfloor heating. So, not appropriate for the majority of houses.
- Solar panels, once an exercise in altruism, are now just common sense. Why?
 - Saving money on your bill (electricity prices likely to double over the next 10 years).
 - Earning money selling surplus to the Grid.
 - Installations paid for from cash savings earned, in effect, a tax-free return of @10% on your investment. Compared to, say, a 3% taxed return on the cash.
 - A solar power system will raise the value and EPC rating of your house.
- Installation: choose a recommended, local MCS registered supplier. Insist on the latest technology (incorpo rating AI). Avoid doing your own research (too confusing) and taking up 'special offers'. E/W facing roofs ideal. Installation in 2-3 days including scaffolding.
- Opt for as many panels as possible, and include battery storage of at least 5 kWh capacity.
- Planning permission required for listed buildings. Council has guidelines.
- Get a smart meter and tariff via Octopus.





Happy Swift Awareness Week!

To celebrate swift awareness week (28th June – 6th July), here's some interesting facts about swifts. These birds are the Top Gun 'Mavericks' of the bird world, as they can do almost everything in the air! Swift's feet and legs aren't designed for sitting on the floor or a perch. They can perch vertically but they can't sit like a robin or pigeon, for example, as their wings are far too long. They are perfectly designed for flight and this means they do everything whilst flying - drinking, eating and even mating! True acrobatic flyers. Swifts have one of the longest migration journeys in the world! Our swifts migrate approximately 14,000 miles to return to our swift boxes in Oxfordshire every year! What a journey - really makes us think of 'Home sweet home'



The swifts we see in our towns and villages have overwintered in Africa and come back each summer to nest and raise their chicks. Once the chick(s) leave the nest, they're off - they will never return to the family nest again. Sadly, swifts are endangered and need swift boxes on buildings to nest. Find out more about how you can help them on the Cherwell swift project website:

Gardening in July

Heading into the hottest months of the year, we need to be looking out for our local wildlife that could be harmed by the heat. Fortunately, there are lots of easy ways to lend a helping hand. Even the most heat-loving species can suffer without enough to drink, so consider providing a shallow bath of water in your garden. Add some stones around the dish so that bees and butterflies can climb out if they fall in. It's also important to provide some shade in your garden. A small pile of logs can be a great hiding place for insects from the sun. Make sure you're also helping your grass and flowers survive the heat, as grass can reduce surface temperatures by 10°C compared to concrete, and flowers are a vital wildlife food source in the hot weather.

The Cricket Report

Skippering the Chairman's XI (average age 63) against the village for the 20th and final time. Our mission impossible, which we chose to accept, was to win the game by playing with great passion, bucket loads of effort and almost no ability. And what a game it was!

Chairman's XI win the toss we were playing on the Great Tew 1st XI pitch, a wonderful batting track. I won the toss and made the only sane decision, bat first. If we had had to field for two hours, we would not have been in a fit state to bat! As ever, Alain Michaelis (1-17) and Paul Longman (1-19) kept us tightly pegged back and the pressure was on at 21-2 of 10 overs. Thankfully, Hector Higgins, who was on loan from the village team, retired on 55 not out after timing his innings to perfection, by hitting a 6 on 49 not out. Jonty Renk and Andrew 'Fergie' Ferguson, on debut, bore the brunt of Hector's hitting, but after his departure, my last innings of 4 proved why I must retire – I could barely the hit the ball! What a wonderful bowling display though by Raj, playing his second game for SACC, who finished with 3-25. His nagging line was so inviting, and yet so hard to despatch. Hal Holland also bowled with great accuracy to keep the run rate down. I should add, too, that the Steeple Aston fielders, especially Jonty, saved many runs with their excellent fielding, but still the old-timers reached 197-6 off 35 overs - surely a winning total?

SACC chasing almost 200....for a famous win: Hal (10) and father Lewis Holland (19) set off at quite a rate, putting on 25 in the first 3 overs, but then an extraordinary thing happened. Lewis was bowled by a beautiful inswinger from my dear friend, Simon, who proceeded to take a hat-trick, with all three being bowled (we had already dropped 5 catches!). Steeple Aston were 52-4 off 11 overs and the game was in the balance. However, there then followed an outstanding, but measured partnership of 112 between Nigel Doggett (51*) and Arthur Higgins (55*). They both played with great care, despatching the bad balls, but paying due respect to the good ones. Both retired at 164-4, so 34 runs needed with 11 overs remaining.

"It's in the bag.... Surely, the game was over"? The village could not lose, but "it's a funny old game is cricket", as Geoffrey Boycott used to say. 'Fergie', his first innings for SACC, out for nought; Charlie Simmonds-Jones reliving his last ball winning 6 at Middleton Stoney, took an almighty heave, missed it, out for 1; Raj caught by the diving Chairman (what was I thinking?) for 5 and Alain Michaelis, also caught, for 3. 185-8, 13 needed from 4 overs, the pressure on the batters rising; all our fielders around the bat - some jovial sledging; the game was afoot! At the crease: Paul Longman, who has the worst batting average in the history of Steeple Aston cricket, with almost as many ducks to his name as wickets, and Fergie (if you get a duck, you can bat again) feeling the pressure. Surely, the Chairman's XI had won? I mean, how could we lose? What a finish – Paul (10*) batted with extraordinary confidence hitting some Root-like cover drives and Fergie (8*) hit the winning boundary with 6 balls to go. What an incredible end to a sparkling match, a victory for Steeple Aston by 2 wickets. A big thank you, too, to Bob Longman for umpiring all day and to Josh Drennan, who did the scoring so accurately.

Retirement...I could not possibly have imagined finishing on such a high – a beautiful summer's evening; a climactic finish, surrounded by university and village friends. Cricket surely is the best game? Have no fear, however, I have been asked to continue as Chair and will continue to nag people for subs and match fees as Treasurer, as well as writing for Steeple Aston Life! Other than that, umpiring and scoring beckon; also, the joy of watching my sons, who are infinitely better than their father ever was, continue to play for Steeple Aston Cricket Club.



Churchyard Regulations

At the beginning of 2017 the Diocese of Oxford published new regulations governing how we manage our churchyards. First, may I thank all our village families for the care and compassion with which they help care for our village churchyards. They are places of great beauty and mean an enormous amount to so many people. Thank you for the part you play in keeping them so special. I would, however, like to remind everyone of the regulations, and ask for your help in keeping our rural churchyards special. The revised guidelines reflect changes and habits that are affecting the civic cemeteries. The Diocese's desire is that rural churchyards retain their distinctive feel, and I know that this is appreciated locally, especially as we aim to protect our natural countryside environment.

Please can I point out that the guidelines forbid artificial flowers or any kinds of toys or solar lights being placed in churchyards. Poppies may, of course, be placed in our churchyards at Remembrance time for those who have served in the forces. Also, please do remember not to plant shrubs or the like on graves. Bulbs, however, are always welcome, bringing traditional flowers to the churchyard at the right season of the year. It's lovely to see so many daffodils following the snowdrops in the early spring. Please forgive me passing on this information. The full regulations are on the Oxford Diocese website. If we do have to clear anything away from time to time, we will try to let folk know, or put things carefully away so that they may be collected later. I know lots of families will be tending the churchyards over the summer, and I hope this season of joy and hope will be very special for you and for all those you love. Thank you for your help with keeping our churchyards such wonderful spaces.

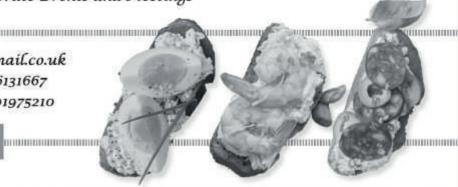
