# Editorial


As I write, we have just had a week of much-needed rainfall to quench the gardens and bring respite to our parched outdoor spaces. Reports state that this summer has been the hottest on record, and that since 1884, the five warmest summers of mean temperature have occurred since 2000, even beating the long hot summer of 1976!

With leaves dropping and fruit ripening earlier than usual due to the heat, some trees such as horse chestnut, oak and sycamore experienced a 'false autumn' whereby they released their fruit and foliage early in a bid to save energy and water to aid their survival. Hedgerow plants have also been affected, yielding early berries which may bring a welcome glut for pies and preserves, but can have an adverse effect on wildlife's ability to fatten up and prepare for the coming winter. Unsurprisingly, the dry spring and summer had an impact on our ability to grow some of our much-loved produce, which meant some classes at the summer show were slightly down this year. However, despite the challenges faced, there were still plenty of fabulous entries – colourful, tasty, artistic and funny - plus much to enjoy on a sunny afternoon, as depicted by the photos and results in this issue.

Read all about the Steeple Village Hall Calendar and how to get your hands on a copy, plus how the church is launching a new Community Garden in association with the allotment committee.

In Steeple Aston, we are fortunate to have a very musical and easy peal of bells to ring. Unfortunately, we are finding it increasingly difficult to keep the bells going due to a lack of bellringers. Several of our ringers are now reaching a more mature age and finding it more of a challenge. If you want to continue hearing the bells ring on a Sunday, for national and local occasions, we desperately need you to come forward and learn to ring. We practise on a Tuesday evening at 7.30pm and try to ring before the church service on Sundays. Our ringers at present range from teenagers to octogenarians and come from all walks of life. Learning to ring is like learning any musical instrument - it takes time and practice. First, you learn to handle the bell on your own, then once you are competent to control the bell, you can then join in with the others.

If you feel you would like to try, why not come and see on a Tuesday evening, or give me a call to find out more. Bells were first installed in the tower in 1674 and have been rung ever since, so it would be a great shame for it to die out in the next few years.

#### Letter from Westminster



SAL's regular epistle from our MP, Sean Woodcock

In August Parliament was in recess, which meant MPs were not sitting in the Commons conducting usual business. However, I spent time in the constituency, visiting and speaking to local people and businesses.

**Opening Magpie Court - New homes for local people:** August kicked off with the opening of Magpie Court, part of the Cottsway Housing Association. I was honoured to speak at this event, and am proud that a new social housing scheme is the first thing I have opened since being an MP. The importance of having a place to call 'home' cannot be over-estimated, and we need genuinely affordable homes supported by infrastructure and investment.

Meeting residents: coffee mornings were held in Charlbury and Banbury, giving people the chance to drop in and share their views. I invited many constituents into the Banbury office to raise their concerns face-to-face and allow me to assist in their issues. These conversations are always enlightening and directly shape my work in Parliament. Helping constituents is a big part of my role and very rewarding. Casework successes this month include helping a constituent to be allocated the correct council tax banding. After intervention and correction made, money was repaid and future payments are now reduced. I referred a mother-of-two with cancer to Banbury Charities, who kindly awarded her £500 to help towards her car insurance, ensuring access to appointments and provision for her children.

Supporting our community: I was delighted to welcome the Minister for Sport, Media, Civil Society and Youth, Stephanie Peacock, to Banbury United Football Club. We discussed the part the club plays in the wider community, meeting with volunteers Mark, Ryan and Clive. Local volunteers rise to the challenge of keeping the club alive, and I am glad that the Minister was able to see this first-hand. I hosted a Q&A at the Ridings Nursing Home, visited the Mill Arts Centre, spoke to volunteers at the local Cancer Research shop, and took part in a session with the Sunrise Multicultural Project's Men's Group, as well as speaking with DiscoBowl about the challenges facing hospitality.

**Honouring VJ Day:** Finally, the VJ Day commemorations in Banbury, where I met with the Chair of Oxfordshire County Council, Mark Lygo, and spoke with dignitaries, councillors and members of the public who were all there to show their respect. This was a real honour, and I thank all those who risked their lives to give us the lives we have today.

In September: In Parliament, I continued my work representing constituents in the Commons, and use the conversations I've had with constituents to help inform this work. # A NEW COMMUNITY GARDEN IN STEEPLE ASTON

For some time, we have enjoyed our Community Orchard thanks to the many volunteers who nurture it. We are very lucky. We are proposing a new garden venture specifically to help those with mental health issues; loneliness; low self-esteem and associated suffering. It will be a community garden, but with a specialist agenda. Where did this idea arise?



Two years ago, Rev Harriet Orridge and I met to discuss how the church and community might help sufferers working together. Research

shows that meeting to garden is a very healing experience. Thus, we decided to find a garden and work with a paid specialist leader.

We needed to identify a location within the village/benefice. The churchyard, though excellent, is not suitable, being too public for people who feel insecure. It is a route way. Through the generosity of the allotmenteers and their committee, we have been offered an ideal plot on the allotments, namely the grass area by the club house, which will be a secluded and quiet area. We are hugely grateful to the allotmenteers for this offer. What is the church's role in this - why is this a church initiative?

Our church is not just Sunday. It is a living, caring community which believes in being of service to the village. For example - the fete; the harvest supper; the church quiz; plus, the major civic services such as Remembrance; the Funeral of the Queen; the Coronation etc. The community garden is yet another offering.

The church also has administrative systems in place suitable for this kind of activity - insurance; accounting etc and is automatically an exempted charity. It is an ideal body to run such a venture. We have already researched what is necessary with a small expert working committee to whom I am very grateful indeed, and advice from Bridewell Gardens (bridewellgardens.org).

We will need to fund a professional lead gardener. To run the garden with a paid leader will cost some £10,000 per year. We already have a generous donation towards this, and I am applying to various funds and local companies to see if this can be raised. This task was my offering in raising the money for the church re-roofing, so I am used to it!

And so, I am putting out a call for voluntary help to all - church and community. Can you help us set this up and support it further as the needs develop? We need not only funds, but also practical energy and willingness to support both now and as a commitment. The rector, the church and I would love to hear from you to help us set this new venture on the road!

- \* Two members were congratulated for their charitable donations: Mary Rushworth had raised over £900 in sponsorship when she walked in aid of the Alzheimer's charity; and Hildy Frenken made a donation of over £1,000 to Katharine House, raised by walking the 485 miles of the Camino de Santiago.
- \* There is an opportunity to once again send Christmas parcels to injured soldiers in Ukraine. The aim this year is to send 1,000 boxes, and we are asked to donate toiletry treats; new warm hats, scarves, socks and gloves; pastimes such as Sudoku, small jigsaws, paints, crayons, colouring books and sweets, chocolate and biscuits. If you deliver these items to the WI, they will be boxed, a Christmas card with a greeting in Ukrainian will be added, and the boxes and lids will be wrapped separately ready to be taken to Ukraine.
- \* John Coley showed the new village calendars. These are available in two sizes, each featuring 12 colour photographs of Steeple Aston. They are available to pre-order at a cost of £10, with all proceeds going to support the Village Hall.

#### **Activities**

- \* Sally Cooper reported on upcoming WI walks and lunches. Just coming for lunch, without the walk, is also allowed!
- \* Sally also encouraged members to come along to Walking Netball at the Village Hall every Wednesday at 10.15am.
- \* Kathryn Coysh gave information about a pub lunch that has been booked.
- \* Merrill Bayley asked for more people to come and help to sew poppies onto the net backing, so that the cascade is finished in time for Armistice Day. So far over 5,000 poppies have been sewn in place, but there are a couple of thousand still to go.
- \* Tina Ferguson sounded out members to see if there was interest in a theatre trip to see 'Emma' in Oxford and/or 'Ballet Shoes' in London.
- \* There were also sign-up sheets for making cake toppers and making fused glass, both in Tackley; a North Ploughley Group meeting on October 21st; and on October 28th there will be a demonstration of how to use a defibrillator and do CPR.

#### Reflexology Talk

Finally, when all the business of the evening was completed, Julie introduced the speaker, Beth Astle, a reflexologist who practises locally in Deddington and Middle Barton. Beth gave a fascinating talk about the history and development of reflexology, its links to other disciplines such as Reiki, acupuncture, Chinese meridian-based medicine, massage, chiropractic and others. She told us what had drawn her to this practice, described her training and talked honestly of how she felt about reflexology and what it can do for people. She explained reflexology of the feet, hands and face. She explained what a typical treatment session would entail - for her and for the patient - and described how she could tell if a patient had particular health problems or a lack of balance. Finally, she treated one member, giving a running commentary on what she was doing as the treatment was happening. The audience was rapt, and when the talk ended there were lots of questions. Beth will undoubtedly be very busy with several new patients in the near future! The October meeting is a talk by a woman drone pilot. Just thirteen weeks until Christmas and then we are into a new year. Where does the time go, I ask?





## **Parish Council Meeting** *Notes*



I'll keep this month's report pacy, as my words have been cut (again!), and there's lots to write about! District Cllr David Rogers warned us that the business rates in Cherwell are about to be reset. In short, the impact could mean £12m of council revenue lost overnight (so no more leisure centres!). While at the same time, our councils could be merged or turned into unitary authorities, so who knows what services we'll be left with! The precept raised by Parish Councils and the role they play will become even more important. Will they even be called upon to subsidise certain services?

"Progress is being made" with regards to 4 Paines Hill, as the owner has at last made contact with the Parish Council.

If we book the Village Hall for a private event – can we also have food trucks in the car park? In short, yes, but with conditions.

The contractors working on our playground "believe they've finished", but there's still plenty of snagging to be done. It has also revealed the huge amount of bark we need for the area, which led to a lengthy chat about bark. One councillor started doing some impressive sums to try and establish just how much should be ordered, the answer was "A LOT". They'll soon be looking for some volunteers to help spread it, and someone enthusiastically said: "It's a good day out" (I'll tell Mr Miggins).

We then had a report about the meeting that took place in the toilet (I was secretly glad I wasn't invited to cover that one), and for the time being, the baby changer is now not positioned at an angle where a baby might roll off it. To summarise they decided they needed to treat the zone as a dairy parlour (think special paint and jet washers).

Given news on council funds, it's unlikely the drive to tackle the Blandford Fly will progress. It will need a very enthusiastic team to push this forward.

Quite a chat next on the damaged raised paving at the Water Lane/North Side junction by what is apparently 'a live well'. Parking lines? Bollards? Signs? Until someone said it was only hit once every few years, which hardly makes it a pressing issue; and I livened things up by mentioning the new S4 double-decker buses coming through our village. Some "sacrificial bollards" were the final conclusion.

The revised Mid Cherwell Neighbourhood Plan (MCNP) is nearly ready to submit. Listening to the conversation, we should feel very lucky we have a team keeping on top of these things (one councillor even claimed to have read the whole 94-page document), as there's a lot going on when it comes to new development. As many as 9,000 new homes at Heyford Park; approval for a group of warehouses at Baynard's Green; a possible new strategic rail freight interchange at Ardley; and controversial plans for a Puy du Fou 'historical theme park' at Bucknell. County Cllr Gareth Epps has called a 'round table' on 24th September to discuss. The PC will be there, so come back next month to find out what happened.


Village Hall vegetation and railings were discussed, and also 'Swift boxes'. I do enjoy seeing the swifts in the summer – apparently all new developments are encouraged to have swift boxes now, and whether the PC should fund a talk on them? Conclusion was no, as this sort of talk, enlightening as it may be, should be 'self-sustaining'.

#### National Schools Equestrian Association ('NSEA') National Championships

Olivia jumped Toby in the 40cm class achieving a fantastic clear round and finishing 54<sup>th</sup>. Frankee had one unlucky fence down in the 70cm on Rosie in a big class and jumped a brilliant, fast clear in the 60cm on Cassie being placed 5th. Both girls had a round in the hobby horse jumping which was great fun! They were very lucky to be given a guided tour of the international arena too, and got to stand on top of the famous Hickstead Derby bank. These are great achievements and opportunities, and we look forward to more children getting involved in the equestrian team this year.





#### Shining a Light on Sustainability: Dr Radcliffe's Goes Solar


The school has taken an inspiring step towards a greener future with the installation of a 50kWp solar photovoltaic (PV) system, designed and fitted by local renewable energy specialists, UK Solar Generation. The project marks a significant milestone in the school's commitment to sustainability, reducing both its carbon footprint and long-term energy costs. The new solar array, positioned across the school's roof space, is expected to generate around 45,000 kWh of clean electricity every year – enough to power the equivalent of more than a dozen family homes.

Rob O'Malley, Headteacher, said "We're proud to be embracing renewable energy here at Dr Radcliffe's and to be the first of the 43 schools in our MAT to be doing so. The solar panels will not only reduce our reliance on fossil fuels, but also provide a fantastic learning opportunity for our pupils. It's important that children can see sustainability in action and understand how small changes can make a big difference." UK Solar Generation worked closely with the school to ensure the system was designed with maximum efficiency and minimal disruption. As a community-rooted business, they expressed their pride in helping a local institution set an example for others. Director of UK Solar Generation, Russell Lyne, said "We're delighted to support Dr Radcliffe's in their transition to renewable energy. Schools are at the heart of our communities, and projects like this not only cut emissions, but inspire the next generation to think about energy differently."

This level of renewable generation will also deliver impressive environmental savings. By avoiding electricity generated from fossil fuels, the system is set to cut the school's carbon emissions by over 10 tonnes of  $CO_2$  every year. Over the 25-year lifetime of the panels, that equates to a reduction of more than 250 tonnes of  $CO_2$  – the same as planting over 11,000 trees or taking 150 petrol cars off the road for a year. The benefits go beyond environmental impact. With rising energy costs affecting households and schools alike, the system will help Dr Radcliffe's save money that can instead be invested in teaching, resources and extracurricular activities in helping children to live life to the full.



#### Seasonal Spotlight – Autumn

It's that time of year when the trees will be changing colour, the air is getting colder and fresher, and we can't help thinking of warm drinks, cosy clothes and playing in the crunchy leaves. As we enter Autumn, it can be tempting to cut back all the dead and dying vegetation in our gardens and green spaces. It's worth considering that many of these woody stems will become perfect winter homes for insects as they enter hibernation, and can create areas of architectural beauty in our homes and communities. In Oxfordshire, the hedgerow species we generally recommend planting (for their capacity to provide for both people and wildlife year-round), and you're most likely to see in your local area, include Blackthorn, Spindle, Common Buckthorn, Guelder Rose, Wild Privet, Cherry Plum, Dog Rose and Hazel. Fruiting season for many of these species starts from late summer to early autumn. As such, by this time of year, most of the species listed above will be fruiting. Hawthorn berries have traditional use in heart-strengthening natural medicines but also act as a vital source of food for caterpillars, moths, and migratory birds. Keep your eyes peeled for spindle, which has vibrant autumnal colours with vibrant pinks, and the leaves turning from a deep green to a beautiful red.

**Riverside trees:** The native white, crack, pussy, osier and goat willows are a familiar sight along the Thames and its tributaries. Willows provide shelter for birds and mammals, including bats, otters and water voles. Their leaves are the larval foodplant of the Purple Emperor, Large Tortoiseshell and Comma butterflies and their catkins the earliest sources of food for bees. Both the male and female flowers (catkins) carry sugary nectar, and the male flowers also carry protein rich pollen, which is so important for developing bee larvae. Willow nectar is also a major energy source for Blue Tits during early spring. Traditionally managed by 'coppicing' and 'pollarding', mature trees can be cut to form a thick stump or 'coppice stool' that considerably extends the life of the tree and lets in light to the shrub layer. Some Crack Willow pollards are known to have lived for 1000 years. Willow is also a useful hedge plant in damp conditions.

**Trees for Bees:** Trees are an important, stable long-term source of food for bees and other pollinators, providing thousands of flower heads all in one place. Plant a variety of tree species selected to benefit bees and other pollinators, with species that flower at different times of the year to provide nectar, pollen and nesting sites as well as offering a haven for other wildlife and cleaning the air and water and storing carbon. On Sunday 26th and Wednesday 29th October, we shall be decorating the museum and buses, and laying on some surprises for our visitors. For children, there will be a 'Pumpkin Hunt' in the museum with prizes for those who find all of the dozen pumpkins (adults are also allowed to take part!) Recently we had an unusual bus visiting. No, your editor has not reversed the photo! This 1953 AEC Regent, made in Southall with a Weymann body, was designed to have a left-hand drive as it was exported to Lisbon in October 1954, where it operated for the (then) British-owned Carris company. It remained in service with Carris for 29 years. It was one of 112 built between 1950 and 1957 for Carris. In 1966, extra seats were inserted: two on the lower deck and five on the upper deck. In 1983 it was withdrawn and made the long journey home through Portugal and across Spain to Santander, where it boarded a roll-on/roll-off ferry to Plymouth to undergo preservation in the UK. The bus visited our museum on 25th August, where running repairs were made to its injection pipes and an oil leak identified.



#### TO SUPPORT YOUNG PEOPLE IN EDUCATION OR TRAINING

The Dr Radcliffe's Trust invites applications from young people who:

are 16 (post GCSE) - 25 years old

are studying at school, college, university or are in an apprenticeship live in Steeple or Middle Aston, or attended Dr Radcliffe's School for a minimum of 2 years.

In the past awards have been made to help fund school or college field trips, tools or equipment for apprenticeships or vocational training, uniforms for trainees, specialist software and laptops, equipment for students at college or university, travel costs, and help with living expenses for those living away from home.

Awards are made based on the financial needs of the applicant, so family household income is considered, but there is no restriction as to family income; each case is considered individually. Young people can apply any year that they are eligible regardless of whether they have received an award in the past.

Applications for the awards must be made by  $11^{th}$  November. Any late applications will only be considered in exceptional circumstances. The scholarship committee then reviews the applications and aims to make awards during December.




