# Be Winter Ready – Introducing Our Village Emergency Plan

As the colder months settle in and winter weather begins to make its presence felt, it's the perfect time to remind everyone about our Village Emergency Plan - a community initiative designed with Oxfordshire County Council Emergency Planning Team, to help us stay safe, connected, and resilient during challenging times. The plan sets out how our village can respond to local emergencies such as flooding or power cuts. It identifies key volunteers and local contacts who can help co-ordinate support, check on vulnerable residents, and share important information if normal communication channels are disrupted.

While the emergency services remain at the heart of any major response, our local knowledge can make a real difference before help arrives. Be prepared and take simple steps like keeping a torch, batteries, warm blankets, and essential medicines at home to keep you safe and comfortable during severe weather. Can we advise any individuals deemed 'vulnerable' to contact SSE in person, to ensure they'll be treated as a priority during any electrical power cut. We also encourage everyone to look out for neighbours - particularly the elderly, those living alone, or anyone who may need extra support. A quick mobile phone call (as landlines are likely to be out in a power cut), or doorstep check, can make all the difference. 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## Unprecedented development threats to our locality

The number and scale of development projects currently being proposed in our area includes the following: two large warehouse schemes at Baynards Green (one approved); Puy du Fou at Bucknell (to be decided); Great Wolf leisure complex at Chesterton (approved but stalled); Heyford Park 'New Town' including its southwards extension (to be decided); Oxfordshire Strategic Railfreight Interchange (SRFI) near Ardley (to be decided by Ministers), and more housing around Heyford Park near Caulcott. We also have 'Himley Village' close to Middleton Stoney (approved and slowly being built), and Botley West Solar Farm extending to near Tackley (another Ministerial decision).

The proposed expansion of Heyford Park to over six times its present size to become a 'New Town' of 13,000 homes will be decided next Spring by Ministers, overriding any local decision by Cherwell on the Dorchester Group's current application for a mere 9,000 more homes. The proposed SRFI at Ardley will generate huge numbers of heavy goods vehicle movements from its vast warehouses.

Although Steeple Aston is less directly affected than other parishes, we will certainly feel the effects of these schemes if they go ahead. Although each of the projects is alarming in its own right, the real concern is the cumulative impact of all of them together on our patch of treasured countryside. The biggest worries relate to traffic and transport issues, and their impact on our rural lanes and their junctions, traffic volumes through villages, and the impact on the public transport system (such as it is), with thousands of new residents, employees, and the services they require, all moving in and out of the area each day. The loss of countryside, farming land and the impact on the natural environment, wildlife, air quality and so forth, are also of major concern.

Some of the projects are to be decided by Government Ministers, over the heads of the local planning authority, Cherwell District Council. Most of the local parish councils and parish meetings are expressing their opposition to these schemes, and some are also focussed on the measures needed to mitigate the developments, perhaps grimly assuming an inevitable outcome of approvals for most or all of the schemes. Revamping Junction 10 on the M40, traffic-calming, enforcement of HGV routing agreements, requiring community benefits to be delivered early – these are all aspects of mitigation, after the stable door has been slammed shut.

Something is needed to help decision-makers to look at the bigger picture. Oxfordshire County Council is producing a local 'Movement and Place Plan' for Bicester West and Mid-Cherwell, as part of the County's strategic transport planning function. This is apparently to be done at pace, with local consultation on it starting next month. It will form a new part of the County Council's existing Local Transport and Connectivity Plan, and will be intended to show how all this development (and the impacts it will generate) can function effectively. While, of course, this is better than not having such a plan, it will probably be too late to have a great deal of effect on the scale or nature of the proposals.

Most politicians seem to accept that more growth is a good thing, and that their role as decision-makers is to react to the market place in a cautiously positive way. Not everyone would agree. The need for these huge projects must be questioned, and a proper balance found with the modest growth of rural communities, while avoiding these large-scale developments and the confusion they will bring. 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

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




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
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## Going the extra mile!

#### November Wildlife

Bees in Winter: Heading into the cold winter months, we need to be even more considerate to our local bees than usual. In winter, honeybee queens remain in their hives with the exception of particularly sunny days. Bumblebee queens may also emerge from hibernation if prompted by mild weather. Solitary bees will leave their nests once ready to mate. When bees emerge during winter, they need access to nectar, or they risk dying of starvation. In order to help these pollinators survive the winter, we recommend you plant winter bloomers in your garden. These include single flowered Hellebores (the open face gives great access to pollen and nectar!), Crocuses (make sure to plant them in an area with lots of light so they fully open), Snowdrops and Aconites. Ivy also works well as a



late nectar source, as well as shelter from any harsh conditions. If gardening isn't your thing, you can make natural spaces bee friendly by creating twig and leaf piles (which can be as easy as not raking your garden when fallen leaves drop!) and caring for wayward queen bumblebees by either carefully relocating them to flowers or offering her a 1:1 sugar and water solution.

#### Tips for looking after our hedgehogs this winter

Always move your burn piles before you light them, as hedgehogs and frogs often use them to sleep in. This is, after-all, how hedgehogs were once upon a time cooked to be eaten! Thankfully it is now illegal to eat this endangered species.

If you find a sick or injured hedgehog, or one that's up and about during the middle of the day, call either Oxfordshire Wildlife Rescue centre on <u>07549322464</u> or <u>Tiggywinkle's</u> wildlife hospital on <u>01844 292292.</u>

Leave some areas untouched! Messy log piles, long grass and fallen leaves are great for hibernating hedgehogs. Please leave a wild area in your garden so hedgehogs can hibernate in peace - cosy and safe.

Put out a shallow dish of water or make sure your ponds are easy to get out of for hedgehogs, so they have water to drink. Sometimes hedgehogs come out of hibernation to eat and drink, especially in warmer weather, so even at this time of year, putting out water can help.

Avoid using pesticides or herbicides as this will make hedgehogs very ill.

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# WI Report

Wow, what a busy month this is for the WI, with so many different events to join in with.

- The poppy cascade has been completed. This has been an enormous effort from the whole village. Over 6,000 poppies were made and every poppy will be used, either on the cascade, decorations for the doors and interior of the church or for the war memorial. BBC local news is coming to film the cascade being hauled up on the 1st of November. There will be a short service led by Harriet Orridge by the cascade at 10.50am on the 11th November, followed by tea, coffee and cake in the Sport and Rec building. On Remembrance Sunday, there will be a service in church, followed by the walk to the war memorial and laying of wreaths.
- Walking netball is going well. More players are always welcome.
- A big group are going to see 'Emma' at the Oxford Playhouse, followed by a meal out.
- CPR and defibrillator training is taking place in the village hall on Tuesday 28<sup>th</sup> October. This will be free to WI members as part of the WI 'Bystanders save lives' campaign. If there are spare places, these will be offered at a small cost.
- North Ploughley Group meeting was held in Steeple Aston on October 21st. We are hosting other WI groups. Lynn Humberstone will be leading a craft session on willow weaving.
- Hildy thanked everyone for the massive response for Christmas gifts to go to the injured in hospitals in Ukraine. She now has the unenviable job of packaging it all up.

On to the speaker for the evening, Janine Kilroe talked about being a drone pilot. Her background was in photography, but as drone cameras improved, she decided to capture the world from a different angle. She took a week of training to get a drone pilot licence. There are many regulations around the use of drones, for example, the height at which a drone is allowed to fly and that it must be in eye view at all times. Janine showed us beautiful still photographs taken from the drone, some of which have been exhibited nationally, as well as some stunning video sequences that she sets to music to really capture the feel of a place. Janine's work has also been used by farmers, as she is able to set her drone to take multiple pictures, travelling in straight lines across farmland. The data is fed into software to provide accurate mapping and acreage of fields, and has been used to help farmers get compensation when their fields have been purchased for use for HS2. Similar technology can distinguish weeds from an arable crop, when spraying a field with herbicide. This saves money on chemicals, is better for the environment and for the food we eat. A very fascinating talk.

What is your favourite saying or piece of advice? In my line of work one mantra in particular serves me well: "fall in love with the problem, not the solution".



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
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# THE VALENTINE CLUB

OCC Cllr Gareth Epps gave us his report and thanked members for going along to his 'round table' and participating in the discussion on planning issues – Heyford Park, Ardley Rail Freight Depot and Puy de Fou (historical 'theme park') in Bucknell – all currently on the table. He believes it's important to look at the cumulative effect of these applications, and says feel free to contact him at the County Council and make your feelings known!

I took the opportunity to grab Cllr Epps and quiz him on the new ('temporary') congestion charge being implemented in Oxford – he told me that we were in the zone which could apply for 25 free permits into the city centre (I'll get Mr Miggins on the hotline), although I was assured that it's only really Westgate that we'll now struggle to get to by car. Gareth recommended more useful info here:

The Chair thanked all those who helped lay down bark in our newly renovated play area. However, apparently, we need even more bark. I got the feeling that everyone felt quite warm and fuzzy at the thought of how popular our lovely playground is (our bark volunteers came from outside the village), and a few councillors seemed to sit up and take notice when someone mentioned our popularity was partly down to 'influencer mums'! I suggested it was probably the fact we have a toilet, and someone else said the proximity of the school helped. Good news on the drains too! HART (Highways Asset Response Team) have scheduled a 'deep clean' on Water Lane and a wider village clean in due course as well. The MCNP Forum was well attended and we heard how these 11 parishes working together is 'impressive' and, with all this planning nonsense on-going, I daresay pretty important too!

There was some discussion on Village Hall maintenance, including size of bushes, which in some cases are getting out of control. The PC decided to take on a freelance gardener to keep things in trim. We are also getting some building surveys done – apparently drones are used to assess the condition of roofs these days. And we have a 'very busy' wasps' nest to contend with as well. A brief update on the overgrown house on Paines Hill – I got a bit confused when some Latin was read out in one email, but suffice to say 'the owner is in contact with us', which if you ask me, is a step in the right direction.

The next two and half pages of my sizeable notepad were taken up with a discussion on the multitude of developments proposed in our area. Will Steeple Aston be considered "too out of the way" for any Section106 money? What will the impact be on congestion and traffic in the area? If there are another 25,000 residents and six new schools in Heyford Park (as proposed), will we see a decline in numbers at Dr Radcliffe's? Do we have enough electricity and water for these new dwellings? Deddington Health Centre "will be mullered" by these numbers and so on. Cllr David Rogers (CDC) is attending a very important sounding meeting in London where he will ask Steve Reed (Secretary of State for Housing, Communities & Local Govt) about it all. While our PC will have a separate Planning Committee meeting to discuss further – I encourage you to find out more and make your feelings known!

That's all I have room for – until the next meeting (17th November).

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

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
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# Steeple Aston Golf Society


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
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
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# Steeple Aston Garden Club

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# Album Review: Twenty-one years of *Trouble*

Roll back the years to 2004. *MOJO* music magazine comes with a sampler CD of new releases. One track in particular sticks in my mind: *Jolene* – not a Dolly Parton cover, but a completely new song by someone I've never heard of: Ray Lamontagne. It comes from the album *Trouble*, which I buy on the strength of that one track. So, it seems, do many other people. Three years later, he fills the Royal Albert Hall for a memorable gig. Ray cites his major influences as Bob Dylan, Crosby, Stills and Nash, Joni Mitchell, Van Morrison, Neil Young, and The Band. You can feel that vibe shine through in this debut album, produced by the incomparable Ethan Johns. Despite its popularity, *Trouble* was not without its critics: "songs without a chorus", "songs with no bridge", "songs that feel unfinished". But in a recent interview, Ray says of the songs: "listening to them now it's a really strong record".

Since 2004, Ray has released another eight albums, but the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the release of *Trouble* is the focus of his upcoming tour. Rumour has it, he will play *Trouble* in its entirety for the first time since it was released. As he says: "Some say it's brave never to look back – but I disagree. If you never look back, you'll never see how far you've come. This year, I place a signpost: twenty years of Trouble." He will be at the New Theatre, Oxford on 6th June 2026 – tickets are still available.

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

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#### Letter from Westminster




SAL's regular epistle from our MP, Sean Woodcock

In Parliament: I met with charities and campaign groups, including Animal Free Research UK, Greenpeace UK and the NFU to Back British Farming Day, with priority given to meeting groups highlighted by constituents to represent local interests. I attended 'How to make GBR truly great', in preparation for Great British Railways, which will be fully set up once the previous train contracts have expired. I look forward to the companies that service the stations within the constituency becoming nationalised over the next couple of years. I started my training under the Armed Forces Parliamentary Scheme. Our armed forces are incredibly brave people, protecting our country and way of life, so it was a proud moment to spend time with our soldiers, sailors & aviators. Over the next year, I'll be gaining a deeper understanding of the challenges in keeping our country safe.

In the constituency: After reaching out to Tooley's boatyard following news of financial struggles, I spoke to DEFRA about our canals, promoting the yard and visitor centre, and will host a meeting with interested parties in the coming months, discussing the state of the towpath with Cherwell District Council. Visits to local schools about the MP role brought a wide range of questions and interests from students. I hope they felt inspired that someone who grew up just around the corner has gone on to champion their area in Parliament. I held surgeries and drop-ins to speak to people directly where support is needed, and celebrated great investments in the local area, such as a £115,000 investment to the Horton Maternity services, bringing improvements and modernisation for the benefit of local patients.

Labour conference: I spent a few days in Liverpool, engaging with many different businesses and charities. I was delighted to speak as part of a panel regarding farming and rural issues. I spoke in depth with Tom Bradshaw, President of the National Farmers' Union, and collaborated on ideas with another three rural MPs on the panel. It has been crucial to engage with these issues as a rural MP. #### Church Matters



To help commemorate and celebrate the 80th Anniversary of VE Day, the idea to create a poppy cascade to hang outside SS Peter and Paul Church in Steeple Aston was born. Throughout the spring and early summer, people from across the whole community have been busily knitting and crocheting, whilst during various meetings there would be someone sitting there quietly, studiously cutting out red felt ready for younger members of our community to make into poppies. These thousands of flowers have been carefully sewn onto netting to create the wonderful visual Poppy Cascade hanging outside SS Peter and Paul church.

Thinking about the community effort to create this stunning display, reminds me of the community effort of the World Wars. Local people came together, working side by side for the good of the wider community. People in the countryside took young child evacuees in to keep them safe from the bombing of the cities, parks were turned into allotments as food was grown in the 'Dig for Victory' campaign due to the difficulties of importing food. Young ladies, like Joyce Bedding, moved from cities out to the countryside to help farmers in the Land Army. Others volunteered to fight - soldiers, sailors and airmen - as well as all those working behind the lines to keep them supplied with fuel, ammunition and food. Winning the World Wars took a community effort spanning the entire globe.

As I write this, after two years of fighting, there is again a ceasefire in Gaza. Whilst President Donald Trump is being heralded as securing the peace breakthrough, many nations including several in the Middle East eg. Egypt and Qatar, have worked behind the scenes, talking to Hamas. Equally important has been the international recognition of a Palestine state by various European nations. To secure the ceasefire agreement has taken an international community effort. The wider international community has already been working together to get aid, food, water and medical supplies into Gaza, and will need to continue over the longer term to help rebuild Gaza.

To continue to live in peace, we need to continue to work together in communities, across the generations at local, national and international levels. Sadly, the other week there was an horrific attack on a synagogue, when two worshippers were killed. In this season of Remembrance, Bishop Gavin's prayer following that attack is particularly appropriate:

Dear Lord, we thank you for placing us in relationship with those around us.

We pray for our communities at local and national level;

As we give thanks for the glorious diversity of humanity reflected in our nation,

We acknowledge with lament that for some that diversity can become a source of division and fear.

We ask that you would help us to build relationships of honour and respect.

Be with those who mourn and those who are fearful, bringing comfort, peace and strength.

And help us to be a nation where we value and love our neighbours as ourselves.

Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

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
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


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
