



We are very sorry to announce the recent loss of three much-loved Steeple Aston residents: Malcolm Hensher, Jessie Coleman and Peter Stone. We hope to include obituaries in forthcoming issues of Steeple Aston Life. Sincere condolences to their family and friends. Funeral details will be posted on the SA website and Facebook.

Malcolm Hensher: *It is with great sadness that we report the death of Malcolm Hensher on 5th January. Malcolm and Joan moved into Grange Park in 1993. He immediately joined the bell ringing team at Steeple Aston, and was very involved in church life, serving on the Church Council, and was Churchwarden from 2009 until 2017. His funeral will take place at Steeple Aston Church on Wednesday 28th January at 2.00pm followed by a family cremation the following day. At Malcolm's request, there will be a special peal of bells before the service. Donations in memory of Malcolm will be split between Steeple Aston Church and The Oxford Diocesan Bell Fund.*

Editor's Letterbox



Pothole letter – a response

In the light of previous correspondence, we have been advised to clarify the following points about Fix my Street and the County Council's pothole policy.

Under the Fix My Street (FMS) guidelines for reporting, the minimum size of a pothole to be considered for repair is at least 150mm x 150mm width and more than 40mm depth. The defect mentioned on Paines Hill was reported to FMS and found to be 30mm deep and therefore not meeting the pothole criteria. The report was therefore removed, although it will be kept under close observation by the team and attended to when/if it deteriorates.

With regard to the criticism of the repair and how long it lasted – for many years the Sweep and Fill (S&F) method of repair was used as a temporary measure until the road could be resurfaced. With budget constraints meaning less frequent resurfacing, OCC agreed to introduce Cut and Fill (C&F) repairs which are permanent, and all repairs are now addressed in this way. Once this happened, it effectively meant that the village repair squad, which for insurance reasons is only allowed to do S&F repairs, were no longer able to take the initiative and respond directly. The original repair on Paines Hill is clearly S&F so several years old, and may have been one identified by the village repair squad before the introduction of permanent repairs, in which case it has lasted remarkably well. It will probably need a permanent repair in due course and will continue to be monitored.

Your chance to comment on the Neighbourhood Plan


Cherwell District Council is holding a public consultation on the draft Modified Neighbourhood Development Plan for the Mid-Cherwell Neighbourhood Area. The consultation period runs from Friday 19th December until Sunday 15th February 2026.

The Plan proposes policies which will be used to determine the approval of planning applications within the Neighbourhood Area. It covers Steeple and Middle Aston along with nine other local villages. The plan has been revised following the departure of Heyford Park from the MCNP Forum. There has now been an application for planning permission for a further 9,000 homes at Heyford Park. The remaining villages in the Forum have strenuously objected to this proposed development as have several hundred individuals.

The draft Plan and supporting documents available for public comment can be found online at cherwell.citizenspace.com/. There are also hard copies available to view at locations around the district. The nearest ones to us are The Grain Store Café at The Hatchery in Middle Aston, and Kizzie's Canalside Bistro and Café, Station Road, Lower Heyford.



Driving Ukraine



In mid-December, Graham Porcas and Greg Elphick from Steeple Aston and videographer Cara Cox from Middle Aston drove a convoy taking aid and vehicles to Lviv in Ukraine, organised by *Driving Ukraine*, a charity started in 2022 by Fynn Watt from Deddington. Read Graham's fascinating account on SA website steepleaston.org.uk/ which recounts how he got involved, and their three-day drive across Europe, together with photos from their mission.

In summary: 'After catching the ferry from Dover on 11th December, we drove across France, Belgium and Holland into Germany for our intended destination at Dortmund. The next morning, we were visited by local police objecting to the Christmas lights fitted to the trucks and us running the engines to check all was OK before we set off, this time destination Zabrze in Poland. Another long day's driving, not helped by appalling convoy discipline and lack of VHS protocol on the walkie talkies. The military and police members of our group were unimpressed but we arrived, after some quite strenuous driving in thick fog, being carved up by Polish drivers who seemed to have no concern about driving on a motorway at 70+ mph with almost zero visibility! Another early start, destination Lviv in Ukraine, not far but expecting long border delays. I diverted by Krakow airport to drop off Greg who was visiting Auschwitz, planning to meet him later. I set off alone to catch up with the convoy, travelling cross country on minor roads to the less busy border crossing at Budomierz, where we encountered our first border bureaucracy; illogical delays and general time wasting, finally getting through in just over three hours, then onto the workshop in Lviv to hand over our trucks. Now, the ambulance decided to play up and we had over an hour's wait in the cold whilst the team tried everything to get it going which, luckily, they did. Driving through Lviv centre was difficult, as the cobbled streets of the beautiful old city are a nightmare for convoy driving on a wet night, but we made it, being met by our Ukrainian hosts with coffee, cake and speeches - most welcome, although frankly most of us just wanted a beer and an early night.

Next morning, we drove to the city military cemetery, The Field of Mars. Witnessing so many new graves was very thought-provoking and I admit I was close to tears seeing highly decorated graves depicting so many young men and women in their prime. Even the hardened military types amongst us were affected, one of whom comforted a local woman attending the graves of her husband and son. Somewhat chastened, we drove to a civic reception with the town mayor, where we were treated as guests of honour and shown photos of the cemetery in 2022 with just a few graves, now full, plus photos of drone damage in October, now repaired. We met veterans and technicians in medical care, building support vehicles and drones. One veteran gave me a bear hug, standing on his one remaining leg, passionately explaining how much these vehicles meant, in his case probably saving his life after being rescued from the front line shortly after having his leg blown off. One of his colleagues, also rescued, later died in hospital. Another veteran said how much they value UK support, not just the trucks, but knowing that those outside Ukraine cared for and valued what they were suffering for meant a lot and helped them continue the fight. It made us very aware that these brave men and women are fighting, not only for their country, but for us too. We had a final celebratory night out in Krakow town square, followed by the plane home. From 14th January 2026, you must book a slot online before visiting a household waste recycling centre. Bookings are available up to two weeks in advance or 30 minutes prior to your visit, subject to availability.

Booking your slot is easy:

- Enter your details
- Choose a household waste recycling centre
- Enter the type of waste you are bringing
- Choose a date and time

You will receive a confirmation email with all the necessary details, which explains what to do if you have any chargeable waste, and your weekly free allowance. If you are unable to book online, you can book by calling the Customer Service Centre (01865 519800) Monday to Friday.

On the day of your visit, please bring proof of address, such as:

- A driving licence
- A recent utility bill
- A recent Council Tax bill

This is to prove you are an Oxfordshire resident and are eligible to access our sites for free. If you are not an Oxfordshire resident, you will need to pay £15 per visit to use one of our household waste and recycling centres, paid on arrival (contactless payments).

Sorting your recycling: Separate all the recyclable items from your waste to make your visit quicker and easier. Use our waste wizard tool if you're unsure what can be recycled. There are sorting areas available on-site if you're unable to sort this before your visit. Sorting items for recycling helps to reduce the amount of waste sent for incineration or to landfill, which is cheaper and better for the environment.

Van and trailer permits: Current permit holders will need to apply for a new permit via the website; the number of permitted visits is reduced from 12 to 10 per year; trailers need a permit and must be no longer than 2.4m in length. Vehicles with ramps/tipping mechanisms are not permitted (apart from customers with disabilities), and horseboxes will no longer be permitted.





Julie Hillier started the first meeting of 2026 with information about upcoming events: a local WI walk on Friday 30th January; a coffee morning on 2nd February hosted by Sally Cooper, to raise money for Katharine House Hospice; and lunch at the Royal Sun on Friday 6th February. Looking further ahead, contact Tina Ferguson if you would like to join a trip on 7th May, to see 'The Beekeeper of Aleppo' at Oxford Playhouse, with supper afterwards. Merrill Bayley encouraged people to try Walking Netball in the village hall at 10.15am every Wednesday. Suitable for any level of ability, it is easy to join in and requires no previous experience. Hildy Frenken thanked members for their generous response to the appeal for wounded servicemen and women in Ukraine. The conflict does not look like ending any time soon, so we may well be making up boxes again next Christmas. Members then voted for which of the five resolutions they would like the WI to choose as the focus for action this year.

Finally, Julie introduced the evening's speaker, Sue Smith, Climate Ambassador for the Oxford Federation of WIs. Sue started by giving some statistics, which clearly show not only that the climate is changing, but that the *rate of change* is increasing. Sue talked about our rivers. Most of us were aware that sewage is pumped into the rivers, but thought this only happened rarely, in exceptional circumstances. In fact, our Victorian sewerage system is no longer fit for purpose, and so this happens *all the time*. Sue showed us records for the previous day at Thames Water's treatment plant in Heyford which showed that on that day, sewage had been pumped into the River Cherwell for 17.5 hours! She also showed us a map of the waterways in this area (photo above), and explained that those coloured brown on the map had sewage pumped into them. In other words, she said, this was a map of the poo in the rivers of our local area, and it was a shocking picture!

The water companies are fined for breaches, but the punishments are always a long time coming, and the water companies are not held accountable in real time. For instance, Thames Water paid £104.5 million to Ofwat in 2025 for breaches they had committed *four years previously*, in 2021.

Sue told us that wet wipes are a major pollutant - although described as 'flushable', wipes are not biodegradable. They combine with fat to build up huge 'fatbergs' which block the sewage system, and have to be removed manually. Dirty water poses health risks such as *e.coli* to wild swimmers and surfers; in addition, instances of polio in London have been linked to pollution in the Thames.

It was a fascinating and very informative talk, and made us all think about what we can do to improve the situation. Sue encouraged us to talk to our MP, to protest, to write to the water companies, and to make those responsible for the cleanliness of our rivers more answerable.

Next month the speaker is our own member, Hildy Frenken, who will tell us about walking the Camino de Santiago.





It was 50 years ago today ...

How many of the albums of 50 years ago stick in your memory? Do you recall Bob Dylan's *Desire*, which caused a stir with the song *Hurricane*, a passionate assertion that the boxer Rubin *Hurricane* Carter had been framed for murder? How about the Eagles' *Hotel California*, which became one of the biggest selling albums of all time? Steve Miller's *Fly Like an Eagle* was named album of the year by *Rolling Stone* magazine. Joni Mitchell's *Hejira* heralded the start of her experimentation with a more jazz-fused approach. The Rolling Stones' *Black and Blue* came out to a very mixed reception, and controversy over the way it was promoted. You may be familiar with all those, whether you were around at the time or not; but there are a couple of albums from that era which might have escaped your attention, and which might provide some enjoyable listening through the dark and wintry early months of 2026.

The first is Ry Cooder's *Chicken Skin Music*, an eccentric album that is unconfined by geographical borders, featuring styles from outside the USA, and a variety of rhythms, genres and instruments. For example, Ben E King's *Stand by Me* is performed as a gospel song; Jim Reeves' *He'll Have to Go* is given a bolero rhythm. Cooder is joined on the album by a large coterie of excellent musicians. He himself plays an extraordinary number of different instruments: among them bajo sexto, mandolin, mandola, bottleneck guitar, French accordion, electric guitar, slack-key guitar, tiple, and Hawaiian guitar. Andy Childs in *Zig-Zag* magazine November 1976 wrote "... there's so much music here, so much fascinating and enlightening music." He goes on to call the album "... both educational and ... immensely enjoyable". And don't just take his word for it. *Time* magazine called it "... a pure joy ... a work of art even."

Another gem is Graham Parker's *Howlin' Wind*. Parker is often cited as a kind of proto-punk rocker. The tracks *Don't Ask Me Questions* and *Back to Schooldays*, respectively railing against God and the education system, justifiably earning him the reputation of being an 'angry young man'. However, that doesn't really do justice to his unique blend of rock and roll, R&B, reggae and folk. As well as the wonderfully straightforward arrangements of the songs, what makes them so striking is the directness and simplicity of the lyrics and the passion of Parker's vocals. He told *Sounds* magazine: "I feel strongly about the words, having written them. I get very full of energy ... I want them to feel gritty. I've always wanted a voice like I've got now and the songs I've got now so it's quite a fulfilling thing to see people affected by it. They listen to the lyrics and they know what I mean ..."



Opera Anywhere



The final public event in the village hall last year proved to be an absolute gem, when *Opera Anywhere* returned with their winter programme of *Trial by Jury* and *Amahl and the Night Visitors*. This incredibly talented and versatile company give their imaginative performances not only anywhere – including on punts on the Thames – but also, for anyone – opera fans and newcomers alike.

In Gilbert and Sullivan's ever-delightful operetta, *Trial by Jury*, the audience is part of the jury. This works brilliantly, as for newcomers there is a wonderful 'surround-sound' effect and die-hard G. and S. fans can sing along too. The Judge introduces himself and emphatically states that the trial must be completely unbiased. However, when the pretty plaintiff appears, he seems to waver, and when the defendant tries to speak, he is booed and hissed by everyone. Complications ensue, but in the end the judge decides he will marry the plaintiff himself. Special mention must go to baritone Will Costello's lively performance as the judge, having stepped in to sing the role, with a couple of hours' notice.

The Italian-American composer Carlo Menotti's *Amahl* was the very first operetta written for television and was first broadcast on NBC in 1951, before reaching the BBC in 1953. It became the Christmas Special of its day, repeated each year. Having watched it as a child in fuzzy black and white, I was looking forward to seeing it performed live and in colour, and I was not disappointed. The 'three kings' are travelling to Bethlehem and stop to rest in the house of a poor woman and her disabled shepherd boy son. The mother is tempted to steal from the kings, but when she realises that the gold is meant for the child that has been born, she returns it. Amahl insists on the kings taking his crutch, as it is all he has to give, and as he does so, he finds his leg has been healed. Mezzo-soprano Serenna Wagner gave a performance of power and pathos, as the mother, and treble Raffy Gill-Wagner as the young shepherd boy Amahl was assured and totally convincing. All this, with a trio of kings, dancing shepherds and villagers, made for a heart-warming performance. The talented trio of musicians skillfully accompanying the singers were pianist Nia Williams; flautist Nick Planas and Steeple Aston's very own star, violinist Holly Viner.

This was *Opera Anywhere*'s final performance of their 25th anniversary year, and we thank them for choosing to spend the occasion in our village hall. Please return before your 30th anniversary.

Parish Council Meeting Notes



The meeting started with a visit from two young firefighters who came to tell us about the 'Oxfordshire Fire & Rescue Service Consultation' that's going on as a result of the challenge in recruiting daytime on-call firefighters. They said that Steeple Aston will very much be affected if the proposals go ahead, with our area possibly being covered by just two fire engines (and eight firefighters), rather than the current five engines (with 35 firefighters), with longer wait times and decreased night-time cover. They spoke passionately on the topic, saying they feared safety was being compromised. We have until 31st January to make our views known: letstalk.oxfordshire.gov.uk/ofrs-consultation

Cllr Gareth Epps' report by his own admission carried 'various iterations of doom and gloom' mainly involving potholes and budgets; while Cllr David Rogers agreed that there was indeed plenty of 'doom and gloom' out there. He did, however, gift our Clerk three UV pens to mark PC property with, so that's something. Big news as far as Mr Miggins will be concerned – WE ALL NOW NEED TO MAKE A BOOKING IN ORDER TO VISIT THE TIP!

We heard about concerns regarding speeding – especially past Dr Radcliffe's School. There is the possibility that our local Speedwatch brigade may be resurrected, so please do get in touch with the PC if you might want to volunteer (you will get the chance to wear high viz). Staying with Highways & Footpaths – it was agreed that we have a really super Super User when it comes to our local 'Fix-My-Street' – and what a great job he does for us.

There seems to be some movement on changing the smiley face we all get when coming into Steeple Aston, even if we're going *above* the 20mph limit. The PC have been asking for this to be changed for as long as 18 months, and finally it seems they have a breakthrough and the company in charge (Vision Zero) is responding! The way our councillors were talking, though, if something doesn't happen soon, they may resort to simply putting a bag over the device.

Next, we heard of new regulations that give local councils the powers to crack down on pavement parking and some discussion around the junction of North Side/Water Lane, where white lines have been discussed as an option. I couldn't help but think that a can of worms was being opened, with precedents being set.

It seems a number of Grange Park residents have been approached by developers offering to buy their properties at above market rates possibly with a view to getting access to a field ahead of a potential development. Residents will be asked if they would like to be invited to a meeting to express their concerns.

There was a long discussion on the roofs and dormers (some with apparently no use at all) of our Village Hall and SRC. I confess I nodded off, but came round in time to hear about some interesting planning applications on North Side and also the activities of Nora. Our councillors didn't sound too keen on NORA (North Oxfordshire Residents Association), as they're asking for thousands of pounds to help with their campaigns, for example, fighting the Puy du Fou planning proposal. Our Chair wasn't sure we'd always agree with NORA. I'm not sure I liked the sound of her either.

Next meeting is 16th February.







Robinson's Close

We all know that our Recreation Ground is called Robinson's Close, but who – you might ask – was Robinson? The village War Book of 1942 contains the earliest written reference to Robinson's Close that we've come across, named as the location for an emergency 'rest centre'. The use of the word 'Close' in the name, however, suggests an earlier date of origin. The word is much used in describing plots of land, usually with a dwelling, typically enclosed by hedges or trees. The Enclosure Map for Steeple Aston, however, shows the area which now includes the Recreation Ground named as 'The furlong below Ten Score Baulk' (the odd name for what later became Fir Lane). There was no sign of any dwelling then (in 1768) or since; the land was probably planted with crops, or was pasture land (as we discovered later).

Quite recently, when SAVA was researching village families affected by war, we came across mention of evacuees placed with 'Mrs Robinson, Manor Court'. Our former SAVA member Eugene O'Sullivan recalled the Robinsons at 'Manor Cottages' in an article about the airfield at Hopcrofts Holt. In the 1942 War Book for the village, E. Robinson of Manor Cottages is listed as 'available to provide heavy transport'. What is now called Manor Court Cottages was two small dwellings before modernisation in the 1970s. The 1939 'wartime census' has the following entry for 'Manor Court':

- 1 William C R Robinson M 20 Sep 1907 M Cement Maintenance Fitters; Labourer Heavy Worker
- 2 Margaret A Robinson (became Mitchener in 1949) F 13 Oct 1906 M Unpaid Domestic Duties
- 3 George (Edward) Robinson M 10 Aug 1931 S At School
- 4 CLOSED (*this was used for those still living in 2015*)

William married Margaret Callow in 1930 but died young and was buried in Steeple Aston in 1944. Edward (Ted) Robinson had been involved in the Korean War in 1950, and later lived in Nizewell Head. This 'Ted' was the George (Edward) from the 1939 census (who was only eight at that time); that would make him nineteen in 1950, which would be about right. In 1949 National Service - a form of peacetime conscription - came into force for all able-bodied men between the ages of 17 and 21. After Korea, both he and Richard Walton came back to Steeple Aston after their conscription periods were over. Richard became the village butcher following in his family's footsteps, and Ted Robinson worked locally and lived with his family in the village.

So, we know that there were Robinsons in the village in the 20th century. But we also know there were earlier Robinsons. Looking through the archive's 'village families' files, we found a Robinson family first recorded in 1801, who later moved to Wadham's in The Gap, North Side. John Robinson was a tailor, draper and baker, and in March 1837 an advert appeared for the sale of a three acre 'close of rich pasture land' near the Church, known as 'The Ridgeway' and 'occupied by Mr. Robinson'. The land had been owned by the Rector, who had recently died. There is a strong chance that this land was already called, or then became, 'Robinson's Close'. John died in 1848 and has an elegant gravestone not far from the Church porch.

Unfortunately we can't yet make a connection with the Robinsons later living at Manor Court Cottages, but it seems likely they were connected. Whether Ted was the descendant of the Robinson family from the previous century, or connected to the 'Close', we do not yet know. But at least it seems we have traced the origin of the name of the Recreation ground to John Robinson, around 1837. The Dr Radcliffe Trust took over ownership of the land in the 1950s, and now leases it to the Sports and Recreation Trust.

What should I be doing now?

We are now eight weeks off the Spring show, so there's still time to get ahead. Or better still, start planning for our annual show at the end of August!

Last call for amaryllis planting, as these typically take 7 to 8 weeks to bloom.

Keep an eye on other potted bulbs – do they need speeding up and putting somewhere warmer or slowing down somewhere cooler? It's still a lottery if they flower on the day.

Seed potatoes – now is the time to buy your seed potatoes and start chitting them, ready to plant in March and April. More advice on this can be found on the RHS website

rhs.org.uk/vegetables/potatoes/grow-your-own and there is no excuse for not having enough space – you could grow some in a big tub on the patio.

Daffodils – every year we have the same question: is mine a short or long trumpet?



Long trumpet – trumpet longer than petal



Multi headed – many blooms on one stem



Short trumpet daffodils – trumpet length is shorter than petal length.

Exhibiting daffodils – make sure there are no holes in the petals or trumpet.

COUNT and re-count how many stems you have put in the vase. If the judge is having a bad day, they will disqualify it if there are more blooms than specified in the schedule.

Standing proud in the vase – you can always use screwed up newspaper or metal wire, if you don't want to use an oasis.

CHILDREN'S CLASSES – Remember we have reinstated our old structure for children's classes. Children will now be able to enter classes that are in an older age section if they wish to, however, they will not be given special consideration by the judge for this. For example, if they are 5 years old and enter the under 12-year section, the judge will not take their younger age into account. But I'm sure there is a budding Picasso out there who could challenge us all. If you have any questions, please contact a member of the committee.

HALF TERM... so the children are bored... it's raining again outside.... so, how about focusing that energy on doing an early exhibit? Decorated plant pots are available in all children's age ranges AND adults too. If you don't have a pot, I'm sure you must have a neighbour who would be only too glad to give you one or maybe hundreds! These ideas came from a quick google search. Other classes that can be made ahead are sock puppets or pop-up cards.



Photos are the obvious exhibit to do ahead. Classes include – ‘White’, ‘Recycled’, ‘Aged’ and for children ‘Food’.

Candlemas

Shortly before Christmas, which seems ages ago already, I was part of an interesting discussion about when people put up their Christmas decorations. Some enjoy getting into the Christmas celebrations by putting up the decorations early, 1st December (or earlier), whilst others wait with increasing anticipation and excitement until Christmas Eve, making it a special whole family activity. In contrast, there was much more consensus about taking the decorations down by Twelfth Night.

If you'd visited Steeple Aston Church throughout January, you would have seen the crib still out, because in Church, the Christmas season officially ends with Candlemas at the beginning of February. This is when we remember Jesus as a tiny baby being taken to the Temple in Jerusalem to be consecrated to the Lord. There, Simeon and Anna recognise Jesus as the one through whom God would redeem the world. Simeon, in a beautiful intergenerational moment, taking baby Jesus in his arms, says the words that we know as the Nunc Dimittis:

"Sovereign Lord, as you have promised,
you may now dismiss[d] your servant in peace.
For my eyes have seen your salvation,
which you have prepared in the sight of all nations:
a light for revelation to the Gentiles,
and the glory of your people Israel."

We have sadly lost several village members recently, tributes for some of whom will be included in future issues of SAL. Whilst death comes to us all, it is the one certainty of life, it is not necessarily easy or welcome. Simeon had been promised, "by the Holy Spirit that he would not die until he had seen the Lord's Messiah". As he holds Jesus in his arms, he knows his life is complete, and he is at peace and ready to die. He knows God's love and purpose for the world, and his own small part in that larger story.

This gift of peace, as we face the death of a loved one or our own mortality, is a wonderful, beautiful gift. Over the Christmas period, I watched a couple of 'RomCom' style films telling the story of giving a loved one peace and life again following someone's passing. As we move through February with the lengthening of the days, and hopefully warmer weather, we are reminded of the turning of the seasons, that there is a cyclical nature to life, birth, growth and death, and new birth. Watch bumblebee queens

On sunny winter days, listen for the buzzing sounds of bumblebee queens flying and feeding on winter flowers. It's too early for them to breed, but the sun's warmth wakes them up from hibernation and they need to feed to restore their energy levels.

First to be roused are the buff-tailed bumblebee queens, emerging from their nests to seek nectar from snowdrops, crocuses and winter-flowering shrubs such as mahonia and honeysuckle. Most bumblebee queens and workers spend the winter hibernating beneath the soil in gardens and parks, or sometimes under sheds or in birdboxes. There are 24 bumblebee species in the UK, and the ones most of us see in our gardens are the common carder, red-tailed, early, tree, garden, buff-tailed and white-tailed bumblebees. Another insect you may spot in late winter sunshine is the hairy-footed flower bee (which is not a bumblebee), often seen buzzing around the pink and blue flowers of its favourite plant, the pulmonaria, also known as the lungwort.

Your County Councillor

A very busy year lies ahead for those involved in local councils, planning, or responding to consultations and requests for comment. As I write, the overnight closure of the dual carriageway highlights one challenge. This is peak 'pothole growing season'. Many of our roads were built between 1945-80, and we need to maintain these key assets, many of which are needing renewal at the same time. The world of local government in February is filled by budgets, thoughts of cuts and increased charges. It is challenging – but we need to remain focused on the bigger picture, while I add photos to FixMyStreet and ask officers to prioritise the most severe problems.

By the end of the year, we are told, Government will have announced the shape of our new local authority that will replace both Cherwell and the County Council. Parish councils will remain; we must make sure local voices are heard by these new and bigger councils. Both outgoing councils have a lot to sort out. How do we best learn the lessons from other councils that have 'gone unitary'? Learn, we must. Meanwhile the plethora of major planning applications between the Astons and Bicester have served to draw those local councils closer together. The challenges of dealing with the impacts have been well set out, given the thrust of government policy. What we are seeing is a coming together of local knowledge and expertise for the greater good. People are sharing ideas, pressing elected representatives for action and showing the skills and resourcefulness in our midst. I'll be sure to share those consultations. There will be a lot of them, and the expertise of all of us will be important to shape our future.


